## Obituary and Biography.

A week ago the Leader published the announcement of the death of Roscoe Knox, a pioneer of Lane county, who recently died at his Crook county home.

The following concerning his life will interest his relatives and friends in this county:

Prineville, Or., Nov. 21.—Roscoe Knox, who died here this week, was a pioneer of Lane county, where he settled with his parents after crossing the plains from his birthplace in Missouri in 1853. He removed with his own family to Newsom creek, Crook county, in 1887, and had lived here continuously ever since. He and his sons engaged extensively in the cattle business, and the sons who remain here will continue the ranch at Post, Or., in this county. He married Matilda Jane Bury, daughter of Captain Lotan Bury, June 22, 1861, at Creswell, Or., she dying at Post only last July 1. To them were born 13 children, of whom the following 11 survive: S. L. Knox and Carrie B. Knox, of Stevenson, Wash.; Mrs. Maggie M. Beck and Horace Knox, of Boring, Or.; E. B. Knox, D. W. Knox, John R. Knox, W. C. Knox, G. E. Knox, Lillie E. Knox and Lucy Knox, all of Crook county. A brother, Attorney Jerome Knox, resides at Cottage Grove, but has been in attendance on his brother here since last August.

Miss Luella Morey as Salome possesses that deep, intense and convincing personality that carries her magnetic influence over the footlights and into the very hearts of the audience. There is an added story which deals with the love of Salome, the daughter of Herodias, for Marius, a young Roman, but that is entirely separate and distinct, and does not detract from the other story of the persecution, death and glorious resurrection of the Christ.

Salome, John the Baptist, Herod, Pontius Pilate, Peter, Judas Iscariot, Herodias Herod's Queen, Mary Magdalene and Marius lover of the princess Salome, were all unusually strong characters possessing great faculty for the delineation of their strongly marked rolls. Naught but a greater reverence for the true Christianity can be drawn from this production and an interest in bible history created in the minds of those who have been indifferent to bible reading.

The woeful inadequacy of Cottage Grove's theater and stage accommodations were at all times apparent during this play and with our present stage facilities it seems little less than an injustice to the company to book such big attractions for this city. The grand colored light displays so effective in such productions, are simply impossible of execution in our so-called theater.
