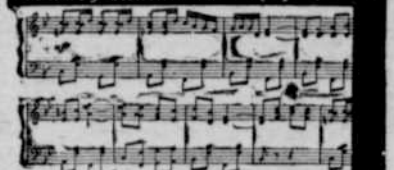
Esquimaux Children
