Three people are interested in the present postal card craze - the man who sells them, the man who sends them and the one who receives them. It would not look well in print to say what the mail carrier thinks of them.

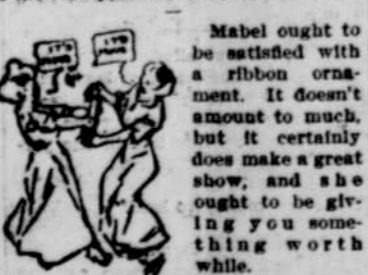
