**KURIOS FROM KORRESPONDENTS**  
Q. How do some bantam breeders get the small stock they have at shows? Are they dwarfed with whisky, as are some dogs, or are they starved down?  
A. No. They select the smallest breeders, especially the hens, and hatch late.  
Q. My neighbor tells me my hens are not laying because I keep no rooster. Is this so?  
A. No. The rooster sometimes helps by adding Biddy to hunt a nest and cackling when the egg's laid, but you can do that yourself and save the feed.  
Q. I just bought some pigeons, and three of them have an eye with a white spot in the center. Is this natural, and will it pass away?  
A. No. The dealer has sent you three pigeons blind in one eye from roup.  
Q. What breed has largest representation at the big shows?  
A. White Wyandottes, Rocks second. At the St. Louis exposition there were 872 White Wyandottes, and no variety of Rocks reached 500. At Chicago, New York and Boston they nearly always lead. At one Madison Square Garden show there were 483 more White Wyandottes than all the Rocks put together.  
Q. Some of my Reeves pheasants have a sort of red leg that accumulates in large knots on their feet and legs, crippling them, and I have tried sulphur ointment, glycerin, lard and coal oil, and I fail to get a permanent cure. I read your article on pheasants, and maybe you have the cure for this trouble.  
A. Melt paraffin. When sufficiently cool pour over legs and feet and cover completely. Three applications a week apart will cure, sure.

**FEATHERS AND EGGSHELLS.**  
Don't let your roosters fight. It's a poor fattening process and stops the laying. A torn crest grows slowly. A torn ear lobe or wattle or injured eye may put your bird out of the race entirely.  
One hundred pullets were given to members of a California church, the value of their winter eggs to go to the building fund. The preacher and official board will lecture on "Winter Eggs and How to Get Them," and committees will visit the coops to see that the fowls have proper care. Now, if there's nothing new under the sun, there's something new under the hen. Where next will the American hen get in her work?  
The S. P. C. A. had two dealers arrested in Philadelphia recently for plucking chickens alive. The one paid \$20 and the other \$20 fine. Such fellows will get stung in the next world.  
The Poultry Association of York, Pa., is trying to get a bill through congress to protect racing homers. The club claims that some of its birds have been shot while passing over states where there is no protection.  
When you find yellow tipped droppings under the roost put lots of fine charcoal in the mash, and it will at once disinfect the whole digestive tract.  
Great strides were made in the guinea industry the past season. The White African is gaining on the Pearl. These birds love horses and slip in to roost on the horses on winter nights. Nice and warm for the guineas, but not so nice for the hostlers.  
Gosholtschen, Pa., lately arrested twenty-five geese for vagrancy and fined their owner \$12.50. The fine not being paid, the geese were returned to jail.  
A Pennsylvania gentleman on return from church took a dose of acetic acid in mistake for niter. He swallowed seventeen raw eggs as an antidote, and after three hours' work the doctors pulled him through. He now tips his hat to every hen, as all should do.  
The custom of some people to display fowls over and over again is a display of mighty mean manners and is on a par with the fellow who goes into a store and helps himself to everything eatable in reach. When dressed fowls are graded and uniform there's not so much handling and haggling.

**FOR BONE CUTTER BUYERS.**  
When you buy a bone cutter, get it on trial.  
Prohibition may save tribulation.  
Our first bone cutter turned hard enough to give a mule nervous prostration.  
We kicked.  
Here are pointers for your profit:  
Buy a machine that stands perpendicular on legs.  
The cutter that is screwed to a bench is a nuisance.  
The machine with part of knives not in play wastes time and muscle; but, worst of all and cursed by many, is the bone cutter where one hand must press a lever to control the feed while the other turns the crank.  
Therefore get a cutter with automatic feed that is so adjusted that it makes the knives cut deep into a soft bone and ease up on a hard one and thus never stall, while the follower falls straight into the hopper, the hopper having a hinged side for easy cleaning, with the cutter plate right underneath.  
The follower should not rest on the knives; the knives should not require sharpening often and should be easily removed and replaced.  
The cutter should not require a man's strength; it should cut tendons and gristle off slick, cut no chunks and splinters, but shave fast or slow, fine or coarse as adjusted, with reasonable exertion.  
Order a heavy balance wheel to save exertion; beware of lightweight machines and exposed cogs and lubricate with machine shop oil.  
A machine that cuts vegetables, corn, dry and green bone alike soon pays for itself and brings good profit, for the style described seldom needs repair.

**FEATHERS AND EGGSHELLS.**  
Pigeons are at their best for racing when from two to five years old. After that their age tells, as it does with "humans."  
The turkey breeders of Indiana and Illinois were puzzled over the late arrival of the crossbills. They didn't see them till the middle of August, but to their sorrow found all the turkeys lined up to receive them.  
The largest incubator in the world is at the Atlantic Duck farm, Long Island. Its capacity is 36,000 duck or 50,000 hen eggs, and the cost for running it twenty-four hours is 50 cents.  
Long Island, only 120 miles long and 30 miles wide, raises on its forty duck ranches 350,000 ducklings a year. At Speenk is the largest duck farm in the world, with a capacity of 70,000 ducklings. New York consumes 90 per cent of this duck crop and is within half a mile of the end of the island. Here we see the great advantage of locating near your market.  
The winter is quietly and quickly passing. Don't push your breeders for heavy market laying. The hatching season will be here in a short while, and then wormout layers will lay few fertile eggs for hatching.  
In the new year let us adopt and practice the boy's resolution, "I'm goin' to be gooder and gooder and gooder."  
When you find a better method adopt it and give the man who introduced it the credit. If you have given people your old method and they have it in use notify them of any improvement on the same or inform them of the more profitable plan you have adopted in its place. This wins respect.  
British egg wholesalers claim that 90 per cent of stale eggs are white, while American storage men claim that the brown shelled eggs, having thicker and heavier shells, keep longer. Is this all rot or not? Brethren, it's the smell, not the shell, that's the sell and keeps your eggs from tasting well.  
A hen in Rising Sun, Pa., laid an egg with a letter "H" on it. We advise her in time to omit the letter "H," for it will put her owner under suspicion of selling storage eggs, and then her cackler will be cut off.  
There is continuous advertising for well equipped poultry managers. Good inducements are offered. The American hen has opened up an honorable and well paying occupation for many men and women. She'll be a political issue yet.  
The Minnesota state fair housed its poultry show in a magnificent new building, with single coops for all fowls. That's the way to draw big exhibits.
