A Matter Needing Attention.

The city council should make some provisions to drain the west side public school grounds, which for the past week or more have been nearly one-half flooded by the filling up of the open ditch from the school grounds to the Adventists church on Wall street. Water from this ravine not only floods the school grounds, but nearly all of that part of town lying between the west side school and the river. If the open ditch from the school to the Adventists church were dug a foot and a half or two feet deeper it would carry all of that volume of water from the McFarland hill to Silk Creek and thereby save the residents of that part of town much annoyance.

High School Allotment.

The county court and Supt. W. B. Dillard came to an agreement as to the allowance to be made to regularly organized high school districts, or those at least who teach high school grades and have at least one teacher who devote his time to high school work. They have agreed to allow \$35 each per annum for the first 20 scholars; \$30 each per annum for the second 20; and \$20 per scholar per annum for all over 40 attending high school. These amounts will be paid only on average daily attendance, properly certified to, for the year. This gives the smaller districts an equal show with the larger one and seems to be satisfactory to all.

Mail Carrier Has Rough Experience.

F. J. Hard was called to Bohemia Sunday on receiving news that the mail carrier to the Bohemia mines, C. M. Smith, had a rough experience.
