Recovered His Transit.

Harvey Taylor, a civil engineer of Cottage Grove, some time ago loaned his transit, which is worth \$270, to a fellow by the name of Camp to do some surveying as he was not using it, being scatered at one of the sawmills there. Camp used it for a while and some time since Mr. Taylor got word from him at Junction saying he had a ten days jobs of subdividing at that place and asked further use of the instrument. Later he got word from him saying he had been sick in a hospital at Portland. Mr. Taylor came to Eugene to look up what had become of his transit and learned that Camp was at Junction. He went to see him, but could not get hold of his transit, as Camp said it was in Eugene, but Taylor came and failed to find it. A warrant was sworn out for Camp's arrest, charging him with larceny by bailee, and although Constable Plank has been trying to locate him for three, or four days he has not yet found him. Mr. Taylor came down and found out that Camp had sold the transit to a man in Eugene for \$120. Thought the aid of a friend, who knew of the transaction, the instrument was turned over and the purchaser is out his money. The prosecuting attorney and officers state they think they can locate Camp and he may yet have to stand trial.—Register.

For Creation of Counties.

Senator C. J.
