The captive was 38 inches in height, with a seven foot spread of wings. **JOE P. COLLIER IN THE TOILS**

Sheriff Harry Bown received a telegram from the sheriff at Wellington, Kansas, this morning stating that Joe P. Collier, wanted here for forgery, had been arrested and was in jail there. Sheriff Bown started Monday to bring the prisoner back to Eugene for trial. Collier forged several checks several weeks ago and passed them at Cottage Grove. The name of Foreman Crites of the Disston Lumber company, was forged to the checks and they were passed on Burkholder-Woods Co., Metcalf & Brund, Johnson & Matlock and others.

The sheriff had circulars containing the forger's picture printed and he sent them to different points where Collier was apt to go, with the result that he was caught at Wellington, where he has a married sister residing. He had worked for more than two years at Disston and had won the confidence of all, both at that place and in Cottage Grove, where his wife died and was buried last fall, hence it was no difficult matter for him to impose upon the business men of these places by working off forged checks on a Saturday evening after banking hours.

The facts concerning Collier's apprehension are that his sister in Kansas, notified a sister residing in this county, that Joe was paying them a visit. The officers learned the information in some way and immediately telegraphed to Kansas for Collier's arrest.

**COTTAGE GROVE'S BIG ANNUAL DISTRICT FAIR**

It is not too early to begin laying plans for the big Cottage Grove district fair this fall. The building and grounds are all in readiness, except that more stall room will be needed for the live stock exhibit and a new and much larger poultry building will be required. The present poultry building should be dedicated as a mining exhibit building and the Bohemia miners and the Black Butte miners should be able to put up a grand exhibit this fall. With all the obstacles in the way of securing grounds, erecting buildings and the extreme lateness of the season, the fair was made a complete success last fall. It can be made a much greater success this fall and the directors should soon get together and decide on a date for holding this season's fair and announce it to the public.

**C. Ross King is Dead.**

The report comes to Cottage Grove from Corvallis that C. Ross King, formerly in the banking business in Cottage Grove, but for the past year engaged in the drug business at Corvallis, died Sunday evening at 7 o'clock after a brief illness. Funeral and burial will be at Corvallis.
