## SWEET PEA DAY

Five Dollar Prize for the Best Kept and Most Artistic Door Yard.

February 22nd has been designated as the day for planting sweet peas for the second annual sweet pea show which will be held during the coming summer.

The Civic Improvement committee urges that everyone plant the seeds as near this date as possible so the blossoms will be ready for exhibition before the roses have passed their prime.

Following is the list of classifications open for competition:

Class I. For largest number of varieties grown by an exhibitor, not less than ten named varieties, twelve sprays in a vase. These will be judged as to quality. First and second prizes.

Class II. Best six varieties named, twelve sprays each of cream, pink, white, dark red, red and lavender. Prize for each color.

Class III. Prize for most unique display. Prize for each artistically arranged bouquet.

Class IV. Largest display, regardless of color or variety, but colors must be arranged separately. First and second prizes.

All classes open to competition to anyone living within a radius of ten miles of Cottage Grove.

A special prize of five dollars will be given the person having the neatest and most artistic yard. Decision will be made June 30, 1909.

Many Delegates in Attendance and Interesting Sessions.

A most interesting and instructive joint convention of the Lane and Douglas county Woman's Christian Temperance Union has been in session at the Christian church in this city since Thursday noon. Nearly all of the unions of the two counties are represented and the local attendance has been unusually large. Organization was effected Thursday afternoon, Mrs. F. D. Wheeler, president Lane county unions, presiding, after which praise services were conducted by Mrs. Tabor of this city.

### THURSDAY EVENING.

The meeting reconvened Thursday evening at 8 o'clock, Mrs. F. D. Wheeler presiding. A very interesting praise service was conducted by Mrs. J. A. Richmond of Springfield, state superintendent of mothers meetings.

In the absence of Mrs. L. A. Baker of Cottage Grove, the address of welcome was ably delivered by Mrs. Tabor, the response being very appropriately delivered by Mrs. Bishop of Yoncalla. She said "we are glad to be so cordially welcomed to the little city of Cottage Grove which enjoys the distinction of having greatly reduced its indebtedness incurred under a whiskey regime, since it voted the saloon out of business."

A vocal solo by J. M. Isham was a pleasing feature of the musical program.

The address of the evening, "Temperance and Good Citizenship" was delivered by Mrs. A. C. Marsters of Roseburg, who for ten years has been county president of the W. C. T. U. This address was very interesting and the large charts demonstrating the enormous sums of money spent in the United States for tobacco and liquor, in excess of the amount spent in Christian work, proved a revelation to the large congregation present, the ribbon demonstration simplifying the above facts and figures that the children might understand, proved equally as interesting to the older ones. It was in all a most strong and convincing plea for temperance.

An impromptu male quartet then favored the congregation with a vocal selection, the singers being D. T. Awbrey, L. F. Wooley, Dr. E. C. Macy and Frank Jordan.

Mrs. Anna Richardson at this juncture announced that the most interesting feature of the evening's program would now be introduced and she succeeded in getting every one in the best of humor before the free will offering was received.

A vocal duet, "Temperance Bells," by Prof. Johnson and Miss Gertrude Emerson of Royal Intermediate school, Silk creek, was one of the very best musical numbers on the program, and in response to a hearty encore they rendered another equally pleasing duet entitled "Cold Water."

Mrs. Wheeler thanked all those who had assisted in the evening's program and announced the W. C. T. U. slogan, "Oregon Dry in 1910." It was also announced that lunch would be served at the church this Friday noon, an all day session being held, which will conclude this evening with appropriate exercises and an elocutionary contest for the grand gold medal, in which contest a number of prominent readers of the two counties have entered. An admission of 25 cents will be charged to the splendid closing exercises this evening. Everybody should attend and thereby assist the W. C. T. U. in its good work.
