The Throckmorton Times of recent date says:

When Odell returned he was locked out and the preacher denied having the keys and insisted that he, Odell, had dropped them in the cistern while drawing the water. Odell had a key that would unlock the door; he put the Rev. Gentleman in a dark cell and made a search for the keys, and after an hour's search he found them in the fire place buried in trash.

He will be watched closely from now on.
