But times have changed.

In these days the wisdom of the ancients is at a discount, except in such places as China and Hindustan.

Why? Because progress is so rapid. The wisdom of age fails to keep pace. Today, unless he keeps pace with the procession, a man at fifty is a "has-been," at sixty a "mossback," at seventy a "back number."

In a former time a man could teach his son the wisdom of bootmaking. Today the son must know how to put on the heels or cut the lace holes—with a machine.

Formerly a man was wise as a wagon maker. Nowadays his son gives his entire attention to a machine that makes hubs.

Or—In his time the father was an all around doctor who treated fevers, cut off legs and pulled teeth. Today his son is a "specialist." In his time the father only needed to tickle the soil to reap a harvest. Today his son must know the chemistry of soils and plants.

In some things experience is valuable, as before, but—Skill in driving an ox cart helps nothing in steering an automobile. These are some things we older men cannot help, but let us not fret ourselves because of that. There is only one way to keep alongside the band wagon—get new ideas, get one a day. We must keep our minds open and our hearts warm and our enthusiasms youthful.

KEEPING BOYS ON THE FARM.

Charles Kirtland of Salina, Kan., has solved the much discussed problem of keeping boys on the farm.
Mr. Kirtland owns 250 acres six miles from Salina. He has three boys—Fred, aged sixteen; John, fourteen, and Chester, six. There are three girls.

In the winter Mr. Kirtland's family

lives in Salina on account of school facilities and to enjoy the social life. So much is the family in love with the country, however, that before the snow has fairly gone all are begging to go back to the farm.

The secret of it? Co-operation, partnership. The Kirtland family is a pure democracy in which every member is a citizen, with the rights and the privileges of citizenship.

Ever since they have been old enough to be interested in any way the children have had some share, however small, in the farm. Each has something he can call his own.

Mr. Kirtland has "toted fair" with the children. If they were not old enough to exercise judgment as to money or property they were properly credited to note how the boys are getting on.

For instance—Last year Fred and John, having accumulated some capital, rented an adjoining forty acres. They used the family team to break the ground, paying an stipulated sum per day for their use. They bought their own seed wheat and paid for the thrashing.

The two boys made a profit of \$450 on the venture. Next year they say they will do better. And they did this without neglecting their home duties or their schooling.

Do you wonder these boys are content and happy on the farm? Chester, the little one of six years, determined to acquire some property. He bought with his little savings a couple of orphan pigs, baby pigs. That was a year ago. Twice daily he filled his little pail from the milk separator and fed the orphans.

The pigs thrived, and a short time ago, when the father sold a bunch of hogs, Chester's orphans brought \$15. One cent went on Chester's bank book.

These boys are not restless and discontented, and they have no desire to leave the farm for a clerkship in the city.

The girls also have their own property. But that is another story. The Kansas farmer has simply treated his children as intelligent units of the little republic of the family. He has supplied the motive—no lacking to most farm boys—of intelligent self interest.

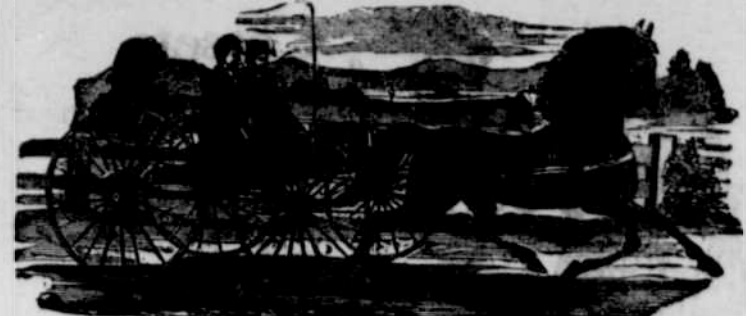
