EX-PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT GOING ON HUNT COMFORTABLY EQUIPPED

London, March 15.—On March
24th Mr. Roosevelt will touch at
Southampton on his journey to the
happy hunting grounds of British
East Africa. His equipment,
which has been purchased entirely
in England, has preceded him.
The ex-president does not trust the
ordering of his outfit to others, and
the outfitters received extra in-
structions from him down to the
merest details, including the pro-
visions. The full list is interesting
as showing what a number of lux-
uries the modern big game hunter
is able, by the perfection of pack-
ing and space-saving devices, to
take with him.

One thinks of the hunter tough-
enings and one is somewhat taken
aback to be told that caviar, sliced
salmon in oil, potted meats, jams,
dried apples and apricots, tinned
tomatoes and peaches, bacon and
ham, lime juice, etc., are included
in the commissariat. Even the game
themselves are not free to be
shot according to nature. Hidden
away among the baggage are
searchlights, which can light a
large expanse of country on a
dark night and enable the sports to
do a little bit of midnight shooting
if they wish.

Furniture of all sorts is carried,
but everything is canvas or col-

lapsible. There are a canvass
bath, folding hair mattresses, fold-
ing bedsteads, folding hanging
wardrobes, a mosquito net-covered
chair, frying pans with folding
handles, gridirons with sliding
handles, folding spades and fold-
ing candle lanterns. Other neces-
saries include a pumping filter,
which renders the thickest water
clear in a minute, water coolers
and even a mincing machine for
the newly killed meat, which is
apt to be tough.

The main articles of the outfit
are three tents, a main one 22 feet
by 10 feet and seven feet six inches
high, covered with a very long
heat-protecting fly; a dining tent
and an excursion tent. To make
even appearances homelike, the
main tent is lined with turkey red
twill. The same tent has a pro-
tecting eave of canvas which
makes a sort of veranda. It is
lined with pockets, and mosquito
nets hang over each bed. The
crockery is of aluminum. A
large quantity of beef marrowfat
is being carried for cooking, as the
game shot is nearly all lean.

The cost of the whole equipment
runs into hundreds of pounds.
The total weight is between four
and five tons. The guide and
hunter will be R. J. Cunningham,
who is well known in South Africa.

PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL FLOATS

The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Ex-
position and the Oregon State Com-
mission are making a strenuous
effort to secure for Portland day at
the Seattle fair all the floats that
will be shown in the "Spirit of the
Golden West" parade at the rose
festival of June 9th. This pageant
will be one of the most beautiful
features of the carnival and will
serve splendidly to exploit the won-
derful resources of the Oregon
country, as each float, car or
chariot will represent the matchless
fruit and other products indigen-
ous to the many important local-
ities of the great northwest country.
It is proposed to make the parade
in Seattle an exact replica of this
particular parade as seen in Port-
land.

The floats are to be one of the
chief attractions of the celebra-
tion which will be held in Seattle
on "Oregon day" July 17, and
through an agreement between the
exposition officials and the Oregon
State Commission for the Seattle
fair, these 20 floats representative
of the industries and resources of
the various communities of the
state will form the nucleus of the
principal street demonstration
which will take place on that oc-
casion.

The Northern Pacific railway in
response to a request from the A-
V-P-E officials has agreed to haul
these floats from Portland to Se-
attle and back again, absolutely
free of charge, having been in-
formed that the Interstate Com-
merce Commission will interpose
no objection to such a plan, be-
cause the floats are to be sent to
Seattle for exhibition purposes only.

Lane county will have an exhibit
at the Seattle exposition.
