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POULTRY PREMIUMS AT THE GREAT SEATTLE EXPOSITION.

The Commissioners of the State of Oregon for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition will give a duplicate of all first prizes won by Washington exhibitor on Washington raised Standard variety of poultry.

All express charges will be paid by the Commission on all poultry shipped to the Alaska-Yukon fair by Washington breeders from points in Washington.

In entering birds at the fair in order to win Washington prizes the exhibitor must first obtain an entry blank from Harry H. Collier, Commissioner in charge of the poultry department of the Washington Commission and enter such birds to Mr. Collier, giving the number of birds, the variety and whether hatched and raised in the state. Prizes will be paid only on birds raised in Washington by the Washington Commission.

The entries with the Washington Commission in the poultry department must reach Harry H. Collier at Tacoma within five days after the closing of the entries by the Alaska-Yukon fair.

Harry H. Collier will visit the poultrymen throughout the state and will assist them in picking out their birds for exhibition. All of the breeders of poultry who would like to have Mr. Collier visit them should write him early regarding the matter.

The Washington Commission desires to encourage the raising of more and better poultry in the state and it is their desire that the poultrymen get ready for the fair so they may win as many prizes as possible. The idea of giving prizes only for Washington grown birds is to give everyone a chance to win the money. Birds brought into the state by breeders of means to win prizes at the big fair is not the spirit that the Washington Commission cares to encourage but it is their desire that the poultrymen win their prizes on Washington bred poultry.

A prize of \$100 will be given for the largest and best display made by any county in the state, \$50 will be given for the second largest display made by any county in the state and a prize of \$25 will be given for the third largest and best display by any county in the state.

A prize of \$50 will be given for the largest and best display made by any individual or firm in the state (the firm must be bonafide. It must be in existence at the time of the publication of these rules.) \$30 will be given for the second largest and best display made by any individual or firm in the state and a prize of \$20 will be given for the third largest and best display.

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It is understood that only birds raised in the state will be counted in the above prizes. In making entries for the Alaska-Yukon Fair Commission prizes there will be a place on the entry blanks to designate where the fowls were raised. Anyone making fraudulent entries for these prizes will forfeit any prizes they may have won offered by the Washington Commission.
