Where Kindness is Not Appreciated.

Dave G. McFarland informs the Leader that he is given a great deal of trouble every year by people, both young and old, who think they are doing him a favor. It is this way. Mr. McFarland has a large band of goats ranging on and about the butte just north of town, which is made a popular resort by the townspeople at this season of the year. This is also the season of the year when the old nanmie goats have an attractive and "cute" offspring to care for. Pruning Maxims.

Start the tree right.
Keep your tools sharp.
Do not cut out large limbs.
Never prune in frosty weather.
Frost-bitten wounds are slow to heal.

Never leave stubs in cutting off limbs.

Prune annually, but never heavily.

Wounds heal most rapidly in the spring.

Heavy pruning conduces to wood growth.

Never use a hatchet for removing suckers.

Avoid injuring the cambium in any way.

Don't leave your pruning to the hired man.

The more you understand trees the better you will prune them.

A severe heading-back will renew the tops of old peach trees.

In transplanting be careful of the root-hairs.

In transplanting cut back top and root.

Do not head trees so low as to interfere with cultivation.

Drastic pruning strikes at the vitality of the tree.

Do not start all main limbs at the same height.

Keep the tree free of suckers.

Summer pruning induces fruitfulness.

Torn wounds are generally fatal. Paint over the larger wounds.

Trees are delicate structures and require careful handling.

A heavy pruning is always followed by a heavy growth of suckers.

Never slit the bark, bore holes, or drive nails into trees.

Never allow stock to prune your trees.

Unpruned, uncultivated orchards are not money-makers.

The orchard is not a profitable source of firewood.

Blackberries and black raspberries should always be tipped back in summer.

Prune gooseberries and currants by the renewal of rotation system.—Rural Spirit.
