and make Harriman the Great resemble a common, everyday Fillipino. Protection is a stern duty it owes to all its citizens, whether native-born or otherwise, and the fact that a person has taken the oath of allegiance to the Stars and Stripes would entitle him to all the accompanying benefits. He would be a privileged character so far as his occupancy of these lands is concerned, and could retire at night—or sleep all day if more desirable—without fear of goose-flesh developing on his hide or symptoms of cold chills doing the Marathon stunt up and down his spinal column, in the proud thought that he was immune from danger of being kicked off the premises by a mercenary corporation.

Whether this condition is in any wise responsible for the unprecedented rush of settlers to the Oregon country just at present remains to be seen, but in any event it is worthy of note that it is an actual situation that confronts the railroad company today in regard to its titles in the Oregon & California land grant limits.
