FEEDING PHEASANTS, YOUNG AND OLD.

More pheasants are fed to death than raised. After twenty-four hours fast three times daily and, contrary to superstition that birds get most of their drink from dewdrops, keep pure water before them and grit. First four days feed custard made of twelve beaten eggs stirred into pint of milk at boiling point, then boil thick. After fourth day serve as part of ration for eight weeks.

On fifth day add a little chopped lettuce and plumed oatmeal. On eighth day introduce kiln dried cracked wheat, split oats and occasionally a little hemp or millet. After three weeks serve minced boiled meat, using broth to wet up a crumbly barley mash. At six weeks throw in wheat and barley for supper, and they are now ready for adult ration.

Feed them greens regularly, but keep off the wet grass to avoid gapes. Old birds in woods are only fed in winter unless food is scarce. In confinement they are fed like chickens. They relish the following: Acorns, chestnuts, hazelnuts, beech mast, grains, seeds, roots, herbage, small fruits, cress, cabbage, lettuce, turnips, mangolds, potatoes, insects, worms, ant eggs and fine cut bone.

MAGGOTS FOR PHEASANTS.

Where do our English kenzens get those big maggots they feed their pretty pheasants? Well, they just skin a dead horse, give the blowflies a good chance at it, and when the animal begins to get lively they bury him just deep enough for the skippers to come through to daylight when they are fat and ready.

The birds stand round and pick them off as they wiggle through. They eat the dead horse germs too. You'll cut pheasant in London cafes after this? Can't blame you a bit. Owners of insectivorous birds should use our meal worm plan.

Mix equal parts bran and chop, add several handfuls of leather scraps for ventilation, drop in a handful of meal worms and watch them multiply. If wiggle worms, they are clean, yellow and fat as butter.

Our birds fly six feet high for these juicy sweetmeats, perch on our shoulders and pull our ear for more.

Veres 12-13.—Does the doctrine of the resurrection of the body rest upon revelation or upon reason?
Providing the soul is immortal is it, or not, of material importance whether the body is raised or not?

If there is no resurrection of the dead, it follows as Paul here states, that Christ is not risen; but is the converse true, that if Christ is risen then all human beings will necessarily be resurrected?

It seems that some in Corinth denied the resurrection of the dead in the sense that there is no life after death, now if that were true, then how much would there be left in Christianity?

What is the process of reasoning that demonstrates the fact of immortality?
What is the scripture proof of life after death?

Can you mention a single nation or tribe of the past, or at the present, which has not believed in immortality in some shape?

Veres 14-17.—If there is no resurrection of the dead, how would that make their preaching vain, make our faith vain, and make them false witnesses?

Veres 18-19.—How is it that all men instinctively believe in the immortality of their departed friends, and expect to meet them again?

It was doubtless true in Paul's day that if there was no immortality Christians were of all men most miserable, because, they were then deprived, imprisoned and put to death; but is the same true today? Is not Christ's religion now a grand thing for this world, even if death did end all?

Verse 20.—What is the chief evidence of the truth of Christianity?
What is the proof that Jesus did rise from the dead? (See Matt. xxvi: 16-18; Mark xvi:14; Luke xxiv:36-38; John xx:4-5, 14, 26; xxi:4; Acts 1:3, 13, 30, 31; I Cor. xv:3-8, et seq.)

Is the fact of the resurrection of Jesus to be proved by evidence, like any other fact, and is there any other historic fact better attested?

Why was it, when Jesus was crucified that His disciples were a dispirited band, having lost heart, and going back to their former occupation, and what was it afterwards that put new life in them, and made them the most courageous men that ever lived? (This question must be answered in writing by members of the Club.)

What became the prominent theme of their preaching?
