Golden Text—The disciples were
called Christians first in Antioch.
Acts xi:26.

Verses 19-20—Who were they that
were "scattered abroad?"

Had these men any authority from
the church to preach? (See Acts
viii:1-4.)

Is it the duty of every Christian to
preach Christ, whether or not he has
been appointed by the Church to do so?

Is it possible to enjoy the fullness
of God's love, and never say a word
about it?

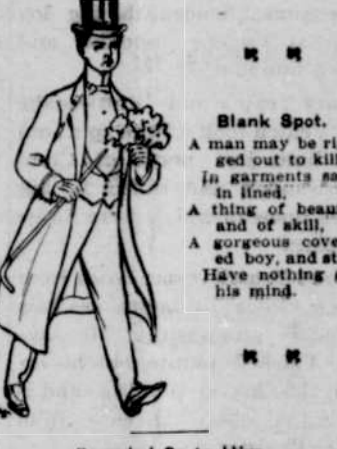

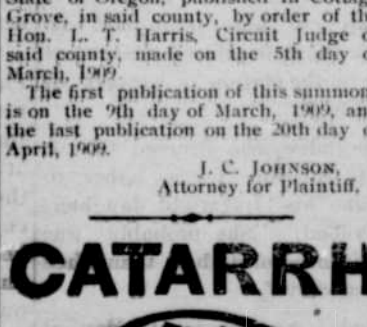
