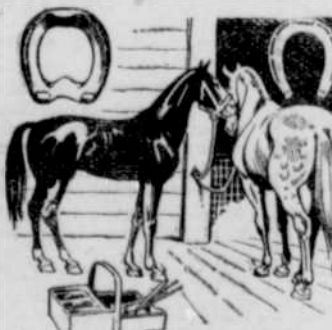

EDITOR OF 'APPEAL TO REASON' NOW ON TRIAL

Fort Scott, Kansas, May 4.—
The trial of Fred Warren, man-
ager of the Appeal to Reason, a
Socialist newspaper, published at
Girard, Kansas, charged with vi-
olating the postal law, began in the
Federal court here this afternoon.
Ex-Governor Taylor of Kentucky
is here and will appear as a wit-
ness for the prosecution.

The government charges Warren
with having transgressed the postal
law in sending out the regular
mail of his newspaper in envel-
opes on which was printed in large
red letters an offer of \$1000 re-
ward for any person who would
return Governor Taylor to Ken-
tucky to stand trial for the alleged
murder of Governor Goebel.

This offer was suggested by the
taking of Moyer and Haywood
from Denver to Idaho to be tried
on a charge of murdering Gov-
ernor Steunenberg. Socialists con-
sider Warren a martyr to free
speech.

Warren today reiterated his
charge that Taylor was pardoned
by Governor Wilson, of participa-
tion in the killing of Goebel, for
the purpose of allowing Taylor to
appear as a witness in this case.

CHAS. NICKELL LOSES IN U. S. SUPREME COURT

Washington, May 3.—The su-
preme court today denied the ap-
plication of Charles Nickell of
Jacksonville, Or., for a writ of
certiorari in the case in which he
was convicted of conspiracy "to
instigate and induce certain per-
sons to commit perjury" in con-
nection with the Oregon land
frauds.

Charles Nickell is a newspaper
publisher of Medford, Or., and
was convicted by a jury in the
Federal court in July 1906, to-
gether with Henry W. Miller,
Frank H. Kincart and Martin G.
Hoge, under an indictment charg-
ing them with conspiracy in con-
nection with the operations of the
mythical "Gummettsburg of New
Zealand" timber land company.
Miller and Kincart pleaded guilty
at the trial afterward becoming
government witnesses against
Nickell and Hoge, and were both
sentenced to a year's imprisonment
at McNeill's Island, which they
served. Nickell was sentenced by
Judge Hunt to 13 months' impris-
onment on McNeill's Island and to
pay a fine of \$1000 and appealed
his case, while Hoge was given a
four months' sentence in the Mul-
nomah county jail and did time
there. Nickell was a United States
Commissioner during the opera-
tions of Miller and Kincart and
was accused of aiding them by
taking the acknowledgments of
fraudulent timber entrymen.

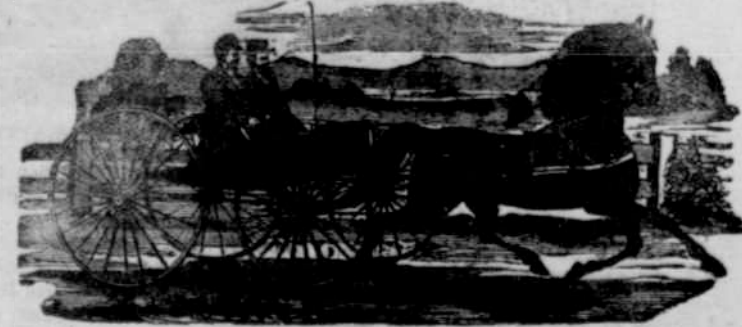
