Seattle, Wash., May 7.—Visitors at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, which opens at Seattle June 1 and closes October 16, will be able to dine to their satisfaction at the city's cafes and restaurants at normal prices. To leave no doubt as to the working out of this commendable spirit on the part of Seattle's caterers, they recently met and voted as a body an agreement binding all restaurant, cafe, grill and hotel men to maintain the present prices throughout the exposition time, and no member of the organization to which the caterers belong will be allowed to take advantage of the opportunity to reap additional profits as has been done, despite protests, in previous exposition cities.

The action was taken after I. A. Nadeau, Director General of the A. Y. P. had addressed the assembled restaurant men, showing them how the increased crowds that would follow reasonable charges would not only add to the credit of the city and the success of the exposition, but would mean increase in business.

GIRL FALLS ON KNIFE AND DIES

Little Daughter of Creswell Parents Meets Pathetic Death

News comes from Creswell regarding the sad and untimely death of little ten-year-old Bessie Holt at her home a few miles from that town Friday afternoon. The little girl is a step-daughter of Peter McQue and while playing about the door yard with a small butcher knife, tripped on some obstruction and fell on the sharp pointed blade of the knife which she held in her hand and pierced her heart. She arose from the ground and exclaimed to her step-father and mother, "Oh, I am stuck!" and fell prostrate at their feet, dying almost instantly. It was a very pathetic death and a terrible shock to the parents.

Fate seems to deal hard with this family as it will be remembered that only a few years ago, Mr. Holt, father of child mentioned above, was killed in a logging camp by a large log rolling over him, and this is the third child which has met with an untimely death in this family. A few years ago one of the children by accident drank a cup of lye and died. A little later an infant baby was smothered while sleeping between father and mother, and this late fatal accident is no less harrowing. The family is related to Mrs. J. H. Sears of Cottage Grove.

CRESWELL NOMINATES A MUNICIPAL TICKET

A mass meeting of Creswell citizens was held last week in Woodman hall for the purpose of nominating officers for the proposed incorporation of the city of Creswell. The following ticket was nominated: Mayor, Geo. L. Gilfrey; Recorder, W. W. Scott; Treasurer, F. G. Meinzer; councilmen, J. M. Shaub, Sam Reed, C. L. Weber, F. W. Ogram, Dr. George Marion Hager.

A prize of \$5 has been offered by the Creswell Promotion club for the best slogan or motto to be placed on the top of the new arch which is being built near the depot. This slogan is limited to thirty letters or less. Any resident of Creswell may compete for the prize. Communications should be addressed to Messrs Gilfrey and Ogram not later than May 18.

Three carloads of lumber and the tanks and air pump for the new water works system came in this week. The trenches are being dug and water pipes laid in Creswell for the water system.

"To prevent illegal fishing at the dam in Rogue river near Grants Pass," says Master Fish Warden H. A. McAllister in his report to the board of fish commissioners at Salem, "I have had electric lights strung over the river for 600 feet below the fish-way, which makes fishing impossible."

"NESMITH" COUNTY TO THE FRONT

H. O. Thompson, president of the Cottage Grove Commercial Club, was in Albany this morning meeting with the citizens, says the Herald. He is going over the state in the interest of the proposed "Nesmith" county, of which Cottage Grove is to be the county seat. In speaking regarding the feeling of the people in his own district, he said that nearly 90 per cent of the people of that part of Lane county to be taken in by the new division are in favor of the movement, while in that part of Douglas none object.

"The country to be taken in from the two counties to form the new county is practically an inland empire by itself, tributary to Cottage Grove alone," he said.

The movement is growing more favorable among those who have looked up the geographical division of the country. The people heading the work are now securing signers, eight per cent of the registered vote of the last election being required.

PLANS FOR BIG RESORT HOSTELRY.

Company Sawing Lumber For Big Improvement at Calapooya.

W. B. Dennis was at Eugene Friday giving general directions to Architect J. R. Ford for plans and specifications for a 35-room hotel to be built at Calapooya Springs near Cottage Grove formerly known as London or Geer Springs, upon which work is to be commenced at once and rushed to completion so that it will be ready for occupancy by June 20 or July 1. The old building will be added to and it will be completely absorbed in the new and larger structure, which will include all the features of a first class resort hotel, with spacious dining room, wide verandas, single nooks and cosy corners, with large fire places for cool nights and large airy bedrooms. It will be about 140 feet long and two full stories in height, and will make a model place for guests at this famous resort.

WILE SAW THEIR OWN LUMBER.

The Calapooya Springs company which is planning to erect a fine resort hotel at their famous springs near Cottage Grove, will saw their own lumber, as they own their own mill. Architect J. R. Ford is getting the lumber bill in shape and by the last of the week the saws will be going, getting out the lumber. The sketch we saw of the hotel will certainly make a comfortable stopping place for those suffering from brain fog or overwork during the heated term.

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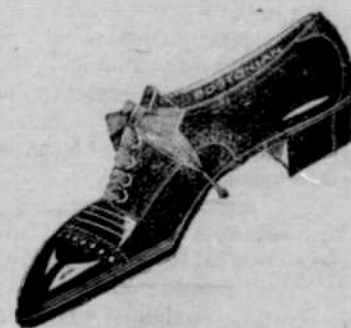
