Twice recently in New Jersey wo-
men have lost cases in court because

Damage suits were brought against
street car companies because of inju-

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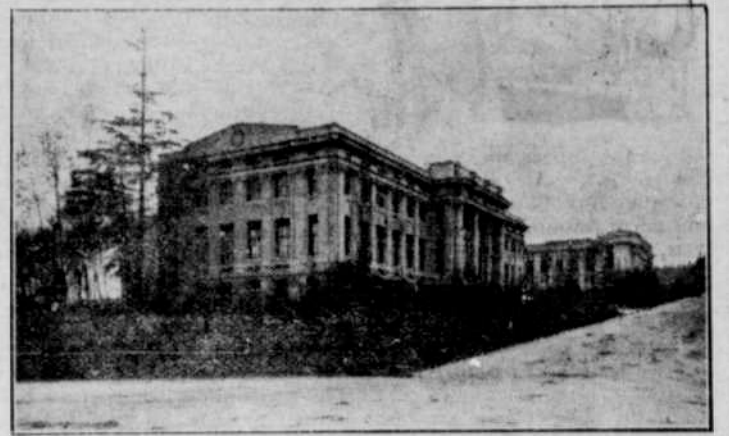
