HOME FROM THE SEATTLE EXPOSITION

Bohemia Ores Attracting
Much Attention in
Oregon Building

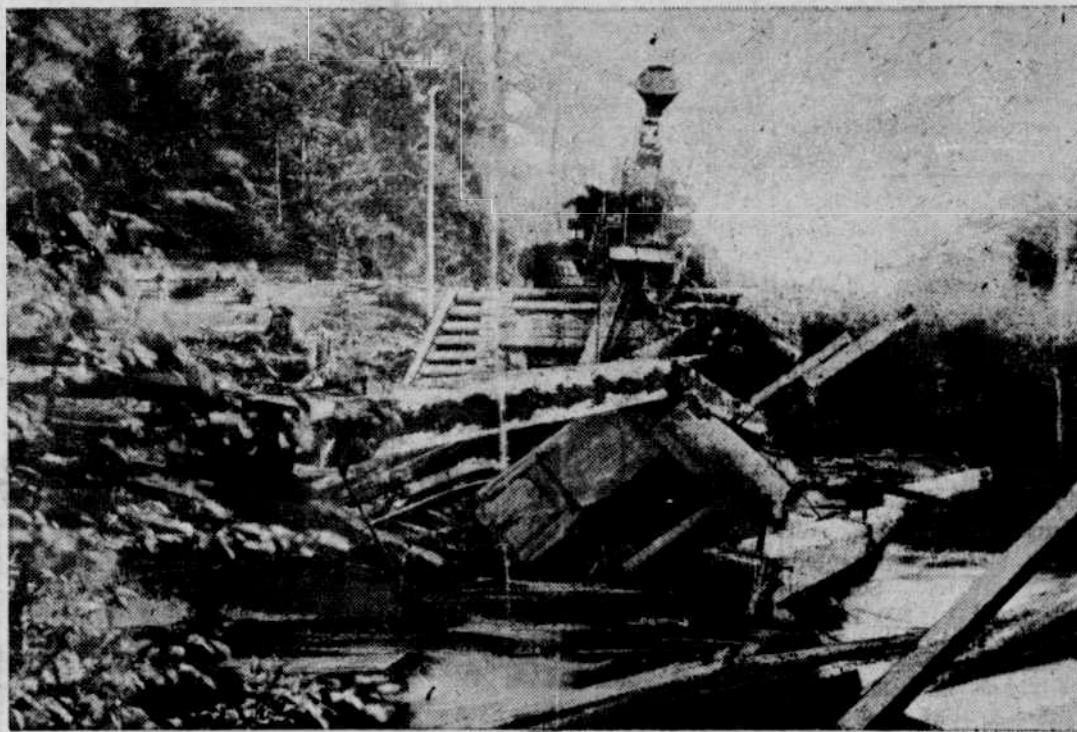
Dr. W. W. Oglesby who went to Seattle recently to install the Bohemia mining exhibit in the mining department of the Oregon building, says that up to the time he left for home Tuesday, the Bohemia ore was the only mineral display in the building and was attracting much attention, displayed as it was, in a fine, double-deck plate glass show case under the dome of the great Oregon building. The doctor says for two days he stood beside this exhibit and boosted for Bohemia, having an attentive audience all this time.

He says it is generally admitted that the Seattle Exposition grounds are the most sitely and picturesque of any of our national or international exposition sites. The doctor says the grounds are simply grand, with wide paved driveways, promenades and avenues. Beautiful green lawns, flower gardens, fountains, lakes and canals. The buildings are completed, brilliantly lighted and present an imposing, handsome appearance. Good meals can be had for from 50c to \$1.00, the hotels charging from \$2.50 to \$5.00 per day for board and lodging, but rooms may be had about town cheaper. The doctor has been approached by the Oregon commission, regarding the matter of securing his services in managing the Oregon mining exhibit, but he has not yet decided to entertain the proposition.

SATURDAY'S TRAIN WRECK NEAR COTTAGE GROVE.



Above is a picture of the Oregon & Southeastern passenger train wreck at the Currin bridge across Row river, five miles east of Cottage Grove, last Saturday afternoon. Notice the partly submerged coach in which were nineteen passengers when the bridge collapsed all but one of whom were severely, but fortunately, not fatally injured. The dismantled engine is seen hanging almost balanced on the stone-filled pier. Engineer Wm. Ostrander and Fireman John Cooter emerged from the river, the former seriously hurt but the latter almost without a scratch. All of the injured are recovering.

tract to Elzie Holderman of Cottage Grove, for the construction of about a mile of wagon road from what is known as the Lang place on Lang creek to the old Prather homestead one mile and a half above, which has been selected as a site for a Rangers Lodge and base of supplies for this division or section of the Cascade Forest Reserve. A substantial eight-room bungalow or lodge will be built as soon as lumber and timbers can be placed on the ground over the new road, six or eight acres will be cleared and seeded to grass for hay for the rangers horses, and a garden and fruit plat will also be provided for Uncle Sam's rangers. The site is ideal for such a ranger headquarters or lodge and has long been a favorite resort for Cottage Grove hunters and anglers, as Lang creek and its tributaries abound in trout. The site of this lodge is a basin comprising some ten or fifteen acres, sheltered by lofty mountain peaks and on the trail to the big meadows and other prominent points in the reserve. It is only about two miles from the eastern terminus of the O. & S. E. railroad running out from this city and therefore easy of access. This lodge which is one of the first to be provided in the Cascade reserve, will be of great convenience to the rangers as well as the supervisor, in directing the affairs of the reserve from a convenient, central mountain point. The lodge will be placed in the keeping of the family of one of the rangers.
