### AT THE CITY PARK.

Fully \$1,200 is being expended in the improvement of Cottage Grove's beautiful natural five acre city park. Nature has been lavish in her contributions toward beautifying this pretty convenient site on east Main street. The present improvement work consists of removing the underbrush and trimming the stately black oak and evergreen trees and laying 345 feet of concrete sidewalk six feet wide, fronting on Main street, two feet from which on the outside is also being constructed the concrete curbing, between which and the concrete sidewalk, will be planted bulbs of choice plants. The committee of the Woman's Club, Mrs. A. B. Wood, chairman, hopes the present fund will be ample to lay the sidewalk and curbing and finish the work of trimming up the trees on the five acre tract, a fund for the construction of driveways, flower beds, drainage sewers and other improvements to be provided later. This is an acquisition to our city of which every citizen should be proud and to which every one can point with a just degree of pride. Visit the park and assist morally, if not financially, in its beautification.

## LIFE IS CRUSHED OUT BY BIG TREE

Eugene, June 10.—George Cox, a timberman, aged 24 years, was instantly killed by a falling tree yesterday on a place known as Excelsior island about five miles northeast of Eugene. The accident happened at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

The unfortunate man and his brother, Will Cox were felling balm timber for Royce & Peterson of the Excelsior works. They had sawed almost through a balm tree three feet in diameter. With a fourth of the trunk yet to be severed, the ponderous bulk swayed in the air careened to one side and started to fall in a direction contrary to the way it had been blocked. In falling, the base was rent in twain, making its descent doubly hazardous. George was standing in the rear and to one side, experience having taught him that most trees "kick" straight back in falling.

Contrary to expectations, the main portion of the tree skidded back quartering over the split base and struck George squarely in the face, felling him like an ox, and driving his body into the earth. His skull was crushed like an egg shell and every rib in his body was broken.

So thoroughly did the huge bulk of the fallen tree cover the body of its victim that half an hour elapsed in Will's search for his brother before a foot protruding from beneath the tree trunk disclosed the sad and untimely fate of George.

George Cox resided temporarily on the island with his mother, they having erected tents pending the completion of the contract of timber cutting. Will Cox and family had provided similar quarters near by. Deceased was an exemplary young man and very industrious. His death comes as a shock to a large circle of friends.

### FUNERAL OF GEORGE COX.

The funeral of George Cox, killed by a falling tree, will be held at 2 p. m. today at Gordon undertaking parlors. Rev. B. C. Tabor of Cottage Grove will conduct the services. Interment will be made in the Gillespie cemetery.

### A Swell Fountain.
