## SHOULD GET TOGETHER AND SETTLE DISPUTE

Seattle, Wash., June 13.—The  
Supreme Court of the United States  
believes that the states of Oregon  
and Washington should get to-  
gether and settle their boundary  
dispute along the Columbia River,  
without going into court. This  
opinion is expressed in denying the  
petition of Washington for a re-  
hearing. The controversy con-  
cerns jurisdiction over inconsider-  
able islands, which are valuable  
only for the fishing grounds sur-  
rounding them. As a result of dis-  
puted jurisdiction there have been  
frequent conflicts between the au-  
thorities of both states in the ad-  
ministration of their respective  
laws. The Supreme Court holds  
that Oregon retains control over  
these islands. In closing the dis-  
pute reference is made to a recent  
act of Congress, designed "to en-  
able the states of Mississippi and  
Arkansas to agree upon a bound-  
ary line and to determine the jur-  
isdiction of crimes committed on the  
Mississippi river and adjacent ter-  
ritory." The court suggests that  
Oregon and Washington might be  
governed by this act, and appoint  
commissioners to agree on a bound-  
ary line to avert future conflicts.
