The annual reports of the K. of P. Grand Lodge show that there are 78 lodges of that order in Oregon and 5882 members. This is certainly a good showing.

Chas. Gates Dead.

Chas. Gates, a most exemplary young man, who has been raised from childhood by Mr. and Mrs. John Coleman, died at Dr. Schleefer's hospital in this city Thursday evening of cancer of the liver. He was born in Sacramento, Calif., Oct. 15, 1891. Up to 1898 he made his home with Mrs. S. A. Elliott, of Sacramento, since which time he has lived with Mr. and Mrs. Coleman at this place. He became a member of the Presbyterian church in early boyhood.

Charley graduated from the Cottage Grove High school with high honors last year and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. Funeral services will be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Coleman in Gowdville Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Adams, interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

The trustees of the Royal Intermediate school held their annual meeting at the Academy Wednesday and were pleased with the splendid condition of the school affairs, and the school will commence the new school year under more favorable prospects than ever.

A press dispatch from Washington, D. C., says: F. J. Hard, of Eugene, is here to close up a contract for a new mail service from Cottage Grove to Bohemia. The new contract at \$1000 per year will begin July 5.

Death of C. F. Hawley.

Regarding the death of C. F. Hawley, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Hawley, of Row River valley, Thursday's Portland Oregonian said:

"C. F. Hawley, a civil engineer who has been working temporarily at the carpenter's trade in this city and rooming at 205 1/2 Fourth street, committed suicide Wednesday morning June 23, 1909, near the entrance to City Park by shooting himself in the mouth with a 22-caliber revolver. Hawley's home was near Cottage Grove, Oregon, and his parents, who live there have been notified. He was suffering from melancholia and at the time is believed to have been mentally unbalanced.

Henry Kollmer, of San Francisco, who was strolling near the park found Hawley lying face downward with the blood flowing from his mouth and the revolver lying by his side. He was still alive and was removed by the police to St. Vincent's Hospital, where he died soon after.

In a notebook in one of his pockets the following note was found: "Dear father, sisters and brothers, I send best wishes to you all and for all time. Goodbye. C. F. Hawley."

Hawley had been under the care of Dr. Gustav Baar, who says that the man had been suffering from a mental derangement and was under the belief that he was being persecuted by unknown persons. Deputy Coroner Dunning removed the body to the morgue of Dunning, McEntee & Gilbaugh, where it is being held pending advices from his home.

Hawley spent the greater part of Tuesday in the law offices of John F. Logan, in the Mohawk building. Hawley represented to Mr. Logan that he was the owner of considerable property on the Columbia River. He also said he was fearful for his life, explaining that several persons were attempting to poison him and secure possession of the property.

The body was received at Cottage Grove, by Undertaker Marion Veatch, and the father and family of the deceased, this morning. Funeral services were conducted at 11 o'clock a. m., interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.
