A Leader representative made a hasty inspection of the sweet pea pavillion or show room at the fair grounds today just before going to press and was astonished at the beautiful and fragrant display. There is hunting, evergreens, wild flowers, house plants and roses arranged as a background for the great and varied display of sweet peas, and some very artistic floral pieces were in evidence, constructed entirely from sweet peas, among which was a large star, a large doll with a complete sweet pea dress and a great art square bearing the word "Nesmith" in the center worked out with white sweet peas, the background being green and the border various colors. There are many other similar pieces and some of the school children have as many as 18 and 20 varieties each of wild flowers on display in the native flower corner. It is a display well worth the seeing and the small price of admission.

LUMBERMEN FORM A SELLING AGENCY

Leading lumbermen of Portland and the Willamette valley are planning to organize a joint selling agency, which will materially reduce the expense of marketing their product and at the same time will eliminate a large number of middle-men. It is anticipated that a dozen or more mills will enter this agreement, being plants with a combined daily output of something like 2,000,000 feet which are in favor of so doing.

It is pointed out that the expense to each individual mill of keeping a sales representative in the different Eastern and California territories has been greater than the business of the past year or two would justify. The unusual inactivity in the lumber market, due to tariff agitation, has compelled the mill operators to devise schemes for retrenchment and this is one of the most important and likely to be the first put into effect.
