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LITTLE RUTH SEALES DIED AT OWN HANDS

The death of Ruth Annette
Seales, the fifteen-year-old daughter
of Mrs. Jessie Seales, at Lorane
early Monday morning, as men-
tioned in Tuesday's Leader, was
caused with strychnine taken with
suicidal intent, is the conclusion
reached by Coroner W. T. Gordon
and Dr. J. W. Harris, county
health officer, who made an inves-
tigation of the case Tuesday.

The girl died at her home about
1 o'clock Monday morning after
having suffered from convulsions
and spasms four hours. At that
time the cause of death was not
known, but Coroner Gordon, who
was called in the capacity of un-
dertaker, thought the symptoms
were those of poisoning and com-
municated his opinion to Dr. Har-
ris, with the result that the two
drove to Lorane and made an in-
vestigation, proving beyond a
doubt that it was a case of suicide
by poisoning.

The girl had been away from
home Sunday afternoon and re-
turned about 7 o'clock. She re-
tired a few minutes before nine,
and was followed by her mother
five or ten minutes later, both
sleeping in the same bed. The
girl at once went into spasms and
before a physician could arrive she
died, says the Guard.

Dr. Harris and Coroner Gordon
found that the girl had several
times threatened suicide because
of a trivial offense committed some
time ago and for which she was
severely reprimanded by her
mother. It seems that the matter
weighed heavily upon her mind
and it is thought that she com-
mitted the rash act because she
thought the little offense was a
disgrace to her and her family.

A bottle containing strychnine,
which had been used as squirrel
poison, was found in the room
where the girl slept and while it
was nearly full when Mrs. Seales
last noticed it, it was almost empty
at the time of the girl's death.

The Seales girl lived in Eugene
from the middle of February until
the middle of June this year, at-
tending one of the public schools.
It was while here that the offense
which weighed so heavily upon
her mind was committed. It was
nothing disgraceful and one which
a great many children would com-
mit, but the girl was no doubt of
a very sensitive nature and could
not stand to be reprimanded for
her trivial wrong-doing.

CAUSE OF THE RASH ACT.

It is said that while attending
school at Eugene Ruth noticed
that one of her schoolmates had a
new dress. She wished she had
one. That night she did not
sleep well. She was thinking of
her schoolmate's new dress. The
next day she made careful com-
parison of what her friend pos-
sessed that she did not. There-
after it was observed that the girl
ceased to smile as often as before.
Then she became melancholy.

Shortly before leaving for home
in June a clerk in one of Eugene's
stores one day espied her in the
act of taking some articles. Her
mother was notified and Ruth was
severely reprimanded. Humili-
ated and feeling that she was mis-
understood, her depression in-
creased and she began to talk of
suicide. She made no attempts
upon her life, however, until Sun-
day night, when she was success-
ful.
