STRINGENT LAND LAWS

Now in Effect in All the
Local Government
Land Offices.

A new order effecting testimony to be taken when final proofs are offered has gone into effect in all the United States land offices. Claimant and witnesses will both be required to particularize concerning the absence of the claimant from the land from time to time, giving much more detail than heretofore. Each legal subdivision, together with improvements thereon will have to be described fully and separately, together with evidence showing how much of the area under the entry was cultivated, with reference to each, and the amount of crop harvested. The blank for transcribing testimony will constitute three pages instead of one as heretofore.

DEATH OF B. D. PAINE PROMINENT CITIZEN

Bernard D. Paine, for twenty-seven years a resident of Lane county, and during many of them a leader in the affairs of Eugene, died at his home Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, after an illness beginning last January. Before he came to Oregon he had distinguished himself in the army, having won promotion by gallant service.

He was born in Paine's Hollow, in Herkimer county, New York, April 27, 1839. When the Civil war broke out he joined the Seventh Artillery, and served during the larger part of the war as a petty officer in active service.

His wife and Dr. D. A. Paine of this city and T. M. Paine of Glencoe, Minn., two brothers, survive him. A daughter of the latter is also here.

The Knights Templar conducted the funeral Monday at 2 o'clock from the home, 185 West Seventh street. The body was buried in the Masonic cemetery.—Guard.

UNCLE SAM BOYCOTTS TRUST MADE GOODS

Washington, July 17.—Secretary of War Dickinson has issued a new rule in the purchase of supplies for the army. He has directed Brigadier-General Sharpe, commissary General, to enter into no contract with any corporation which is a party to any trust or combination in restraint of trade, or their agents.

LOOKS GOOD FOR OREGON APPLES.

That apple growers of Oregon have nothing to fear from overproduction is the statement of Wilbur K. Newell, president of the State Board of Horticulture, who has recently returned from the east. He says the industry is not likely to be overdone and that the demand for Oregon fruit now exceeds the supply in many quarters. While away he visited many apple growing districts in the east. He found Oregon apples well established in eastern markets and said the price paid for fruit from this state exceeds that given for the product grown elsewhere.

DON'T LIKE SOME OREGON ROADS.

Three prominent Newberg business men passed through Cottage Grove in a Buick Auto Monday on their way home from a tour of Eastern Oregon and a trip to Crater Lake. They said the roughest roads encountered on the entire trip was found between Grant's Pass and Cottage Grove, we are sorry to relate, there being plenty of all kinds of material for road building right at hand along the entire distance, too. They said they met many California tourists going and coming in autos to and from the Seattle Exposition and nearly all stated that they liked the looks of Oregon fine, but would not live in the state on account of its roads. However, an era in roadbuilding is at hand and this objectionable feature of fair Oregon will soon be overcome.

JOSEPHINE CAVES A NATIONAL RESERVE.

Action taken by President Taft in setting aside the Josephine county caves as a National reserve meets with the hearty approval of the people of this state, who are interested in preserving its natural wonders. One square mile including the entrance to the caves has been made a reservation, belonging to the government, by proclamation just signed. The caves make up a wonderful collection of roomy caverns and galleries in the side of a mountain in the Grayback range, about 30 miles south of Grants Pass.

JAMES J. HILL TELLS WHY WHEAT IS SO HIGH

St. Paul, July 17.—James J. Hill arrived home last night after a month's stay in Labrador. He gave a characteristic interview in which he recommended that all members of congress go home and stay three years.

"Tariff," said Mr. Hill, "is the most important issue of the day." "Why is wheat selling at \$1.25," Hill was asked.

"About 65 per cent of the population of the country," he replied, "is living in the centers of population. The question is, can 35 per cent feed the rest?"

Heney on the Grill.

That Frances J. Heney, special counsel for the department of justice, and also assistant prosecutor in the so-called graft cases in San Francisco received from the government \$23,000 for which he performed no service, was the frank admission of Chairman Tawney of the appropriation committee in the house today. He stated, however, that Heney's salary had nothing to do with the \$27,000 deficiency in the department of justice, for which provision is made in the urgent deficiency bill. Heney, he said, had received in all from the government, \$69,000.
