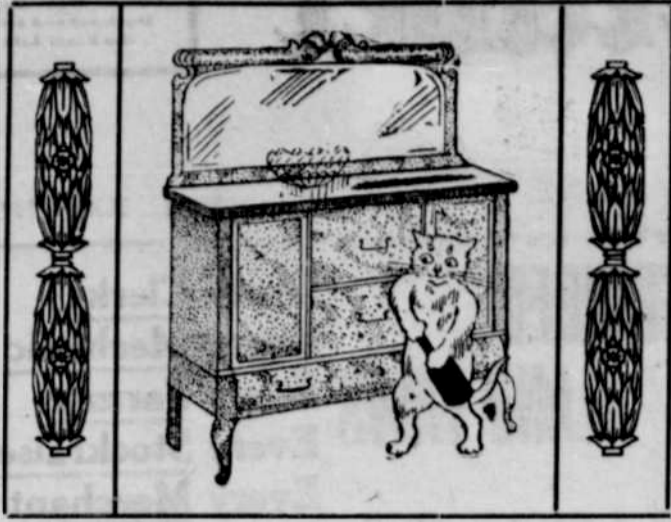

That Francis J. Heney has had a pretty good pull on the United States treasury is evident from an Oregonian dispatch of Sunday which relates that in receipting "in full payment for services in the cases of Hyde-Benson and Binger Hermann," when Mr. Heney received \$8,000, he afterward received \$10,000 at one time and \$5,000 at another, for which he receipted "on account of services in the Hyde-Benson and Binger-Hermann cases" neither of which has he prosecuted. It is also shown that between Dec. 2, 1905 and June 30, 1906, Mr. Heney received \$27,500 for services rendered the government in the land fraud prosecutions. Therefore Congressman Chas. Tawney maintains that Heney has not only been overpaid, but improperly paid and has demanded a congressional investigation of the matter.

Through some error in preparing county seat clippings from the Eugene papers for the last issue of the Leader the article on the work of Cottage Grove's swift pitcher, Baker, was credited to the Register when it should have been credited to the Eugene Guard. We regret this error, and will endeavor to see that it does not occur again.
