The State Fair of Oregon is growing very rapidly, keeping pace with the general improvements of our state, and attempting to encourage the development of agriculture in all its branches. Much encouragement has been given to the State Board of Agriculture by the legislature, largely due to the assistance of the state press. Funds thus secured have been expended very satisfactorily to the people at large and for such expenditures will be found on the State Fair grounds, many permanent buildings and other substantial improvements that give this state institution much more prominence and importance. This year's Fair promises to excel any previous fair held, especially in the live stock section, owing to the fact that many eastern breeders have announced that they will stop at the State Fair en route to the exposition at Seattle.

Disturbed with being handicapped, held back and harassed by Willamette valley people in general and Salem citizens in particular, secession from Oregon and the creating of a new state is being advocated in southern Oregon. Declaring that the southern part of the state is being neglected and that the northern part of California is similarly treated, the suggestion is made that southern Oregon and northern California pool their interests and carve out a state of their own, and the name offered is the state of Siskiyou.—News.

Farmers in some parts of the county have already begun to cut their grain. The spring sown wheat, however, is still green, and owing to July rain will probably be in very late. Reports from Portland indicate that the heads have been well filled in most sections, when the sheaves have been examined, and such a state is likely to exist in Lane county.

### Blue River Mines Active.

A. H. Taylor, general manager of the Blue Bird Mining company of Blue River, Oregon, has just arrived from Portland where he has been purchasing a 30-horse boiler and engine, and sawmill complete for his company. The company now have a crew of men building road and grading out for the mill site and buildings, and as soon as the lumber can be saved, will begin the installation of a ten stamp mill and all necessary buildings, sheds, etc. They expect to have the plant in operation by the last of October.—Eugene Register.

### A Sensible Breakfast.

The staple or what the French call the "piece de resistance," of a breakfast should consist of some form of meat, fish, egg or milk, or its equivalent in a starch or sugar, like bread, toast or cakes, says Dr. Woods Hutchinson in Woman's Home Companion for August. These may be supplemented by hot breads, gems or biscuits, with the proper modicum of fat in the shape of two or three pats of butter, sugar and the alkaline salts in the shape of some fruit or preserves or syrup upon cakes, and an accessory or appetizer in the form of tea, coffee or cocoa.

The so-called cereals and breakfast foods ought not to be made the mainstay of the breakfast. As accessories before or after, they are admissible and useful, but they lack seriously in steaming power, in proportion to their weight, bulk and power of satisfying the appetite.
