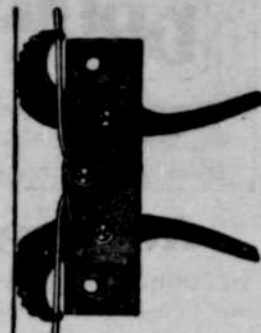

Melila, July 30.—Virtually declaring a truce, the Spaniards and Moors are engaged today in disposing of the bodies of the soldiers killed in Tuesday's bloody engagement. Pestilence is feared, and but little attention is being paid to fighting.

The Spaniards are burying their dead outside the walls of the city, 1000 bodies being dumped indiscriminately into trenches.
