### City Water Supply to be Increased.

A mass meeting was held at the Masonic Hall Friday evening for the purpose of discussing the city water problem, the present supply being somewhat scant through the months of August and September when such a demand is made for water for irrigation purposes. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Job and Hon. R. M. Veatch was selected for chairman and H. O. Thompson for secretary. A number of prominent citizens engaged in the discussion, including R. M. Veatch, Dr. Job, Dr. Woods, A. B. Wood, H. O. Thompson, Mr. Kem and others all of whom favored bringing in the waters of Lang Creek, a clear, pure, cold stream, wholly within the Cascade forest reserve about 17 miles east of this city, providing the cost would not be inadequate to the city's financial resources. As temporary relief it is proposed to install a small pumping plant at the Knox Spring, one mile east of town or sink a large well and pump water from it into the reservoirs during the months of August and September. In conclusion the city council was instructed to employ a competent engineer to ascertain the cost of bringing water from Lang creek to this city and in the meantime to investigate the Knox spring and a well proposition with a view of installing a small pumping plant to put into operation at the earliest possible date.
