BRADY IS FOR DRY STATE.

Governor Brady, of Idaho, who recently passed through Pendleton on his way to the Irrigation Congress in Spokane, declared that 90 per cent of his state would be free from the saloons and their attendant evils within a year. He believes public sentiment in his state is so strong against the saloon that the people, taking advantage of the local option law, will banish them entirely.

Governor Brady says it is not the W. C. T. U. nor the Prohibition party that will put the saloons out of business, but the business men, stockmen, farmers and employers of labor in general. He is not a rabid prohibitionist himself, but he is a firm believer in the justice and efficiency of the local option law.

The governor is a native of Kausas, and he says the good effects of prohibition in that state have been many, far reaching and permanent, while the evil effects are few, temporary and have been entirely overcome.

In discussing the creation of Nesmith county from a small portion of North Douglas and South Lane with a prominent Roseburg politician Saturday, he said that if Roseburg, and Douglas county in general, is wise, they will favor and vote for the new county, which he says, with the formation of a new coast county at some future time will cut off a burdensome lot of territory to Roseburg and Douglas county proper, will still leave a large populous and rich county, which would be immune to further dissection, and would forever crush the ambitions of a certain community which aspires to include a very large slice of rich Douglas county territory into a new county at some not far distant day. A good many Roseburgers regard the Nesmith county movement in the same light.

FUEL FOR 1000-MILE AEROPLANE FLIGHT

New York, Aug. 12.—Before sailing for Europe today, Orville Wright the aviator announced that he had perfected a device for carrying fuel which would make it possible to drive his aeroplane 1000 miles without stopping.

He said that he was confident that the aeroplane would be used very soon for carrying mails, as it would be able to exceed in swiftness and directness of route the fastest trains that could be operated on railroads. He said the aeroplane for use for carrying freight was still in the distant future.

With the new fuel carrying device he expects to be able to keep the aeroplane in the air 28 hours without landing.

Wright was accompanied by his sister, Catherine. He said he would not try for any more records soon but would devote his time to perfecting the machine.

Obituary and Biography.

B. F. Crow, who died at the home of his brother, J. Hardy Crow, in the Lorane valley, last Thursday, August 12, 1909, was born in St. Charles county, Missouri, Feb. 18, 1835, and was therefore, 74 years, 5 months and 25 days old at the time of his death. His parents moved to Van Buren county, Iowa, when he was but one year of age, where they resided until 1852 when they crossed the plains to Oregon with an ox-team. They first located at the mouth of the Sandy river near Portland where they remained one year, when they moved to Siuslaw locating near Lorane in the fall of 1853, where he resided continuously thereafter. He was unmarried, but was a genial, whole souled, Christian gentleman, having been converted to the Christian faith in early life, while attending meetings held by the pioneer Oregon preacher, Rev. J. H. Wilbur, and has been a faithful consistent member of the M. E. church since 1858. For the past seven months he suffered severely from dropsy of the heart and Bright's disease, but bore up with great fortitude, being tenderly cared for by the family of his brother. He will be greatly missed in the community in which he resided so long. Funeral services were conducted at Lorane Saturday by Rev. W. J. Gardner of Cottage Grove and the remains were interred in the Lorane cemetery, the last sad rites being witnessed by a very large gathering of neighbors and friends, an entire threshing crew nearby, suspending work during the progress of the funeral, which they attended, this all demonstrating in what high esteem deceased was held by the people of the Lorane valley.

BLACKMORE—At the family home in the Landess addition to Cottage Grove, August 15, 1909, Edward Monroe Blackmore, aged 33 years, 4 months and 11 days, of appendicitis.

Deceased was a native of Chippewa county, Wisconsin, where he was born April 4, 1876. He was married at Mountaineer, Iowa, Feb. 11, 1903, to Miss Blanche Dolittle, and they came to Cottage Grove to reside two years ago, during the greater part of which time Mr. Blackmore has been employed in the Cottage Grove planing mill and sash and door factory. He is survived by a wife and two children, aged two and five years, and also by two brothers, J. E. and O. W. Blackmore and a sister, Mrs. Wallace Beaver. Mr. Blackmore was a kind husband and father, a good neighbor and a very estimable gentleman, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. Prayers were said at the family home Sunday morning by Rev. S. C. Adams of the Presbyterian church. The remains were shipped to Manly, Iowa, for burial.
