The Lane County Vetch Growers Association has sold its pool of vetch for \$2.50 per bushel. The pool amounts to 3,500 sacks, or 7,000 bushel. This is the best price yet received for vetch and growers are greatly pleased at their first effort in pooling issues. Vetch is not only a profitable crop but it restores the soil and a crop is equal to a good treatment of fertilizer. However, like other grain, crops must be rotated to secure a profitable yield. Everything raised by the farmer this year commands a good price.—Junction Times.

He immediately took aim and fired, the bullet passing through Ferguson's body. When he was questioned he admitted gross carelessness, but maintained that the affair was of an accidental nature. After a brief deliberation the jury returned a verdict to the effect that Ferguson came to his death from a bullet wound inflicted by Bacon, the same being purely accidental.

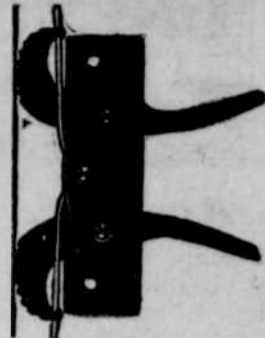
MARRIED.
