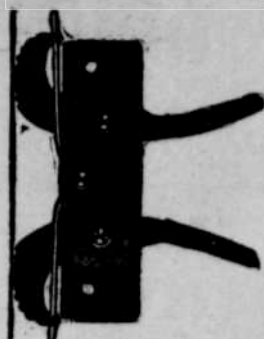
"The best ever"—that is what they all say when they hear W. E. Vaughan, the impersonator and soloist; who will appear here soon. Don't fail to hear him.
