Miss Hefty to Sail for China in October

Miss Lura Hefty, of this place, has received official notice that she is to sail October 5 from San Francisco on the steamer Mongolia for Kucheng, China, as a missionary, for a term of five years. Miss Hefty is being sent by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist church of Oregon. She is going to take the place of another teacher who is away on a furlough. With another woman, she will have charge of the girls' boarding school, teaching all the common school branches, also 16 day schools, a Romanized and a Bible school will be under their supervision, with 300 pupils. Girls from 10 to 20 years of age are admitted which prepares them for the Foo-Chow High school. Miss Hefty has taught in the public school at this place for three years, two years in the sixth and one in the seventh grade, and is a very capable instructor. She is also a normal school graduate.

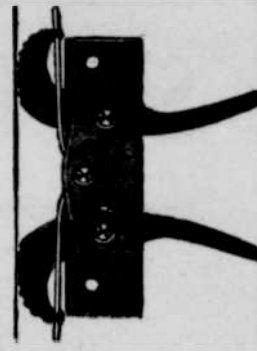
