This same fellow then explained to the Eugene Register, that Moore was pushed from the train by the conductor, when in fact, he did not know Moore was injured until the trainmen called to him.

MASS MEETING FAVORS LANG CREEK WATER PROPOSITION.

On Thursday evening a large number of the citizens of Cottage Grove met at the Masonic Hall to discuss the proposition of bringing water from Lang Creek in the Cascade forest reserve 18 miles east of town into the reservoirs in this city to increase Cottage Grove's water supply. At a former meeting the city council was instructed to secure an estimate of the probable cost of piping Lang creek to Cottage Grove and the report of this committee was submitted and read, the cost of the neces-

sary dam in Lang creek, a 12 inch pipe, ditching and laying of which aggregate \$85,000.

Councilman Atkinson presided at this meeting and speeches favoring the proposition were made by many prominent citizens and as a result C. C. Hazleton and H. Venske were appointed a committee to secure the necessary fifty signatures of legal voters to a call for special municipal election to vote on a change in the city charter permitting the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$150,000.
