FOURTH STREET OIL PROSPECTS

Oil Sand Strata Penetrated
at Depth of One
Hundred Feet

In drilling deep bed rock wells in the southern suburbs of this city, Ralston & Spear have in a few instances encountered small veins of coal and late last week in drilling a well for Isaac Taylor on Fourth street their drill passed into a forty-three foot strata of peculiar looking sand at a depth of 60 feet making a total depth of 103 feet when drilling ceased, a good flow of water being secured. Up to 100 feet the drill penetrated only this dry, hard, peculiar sand and not until three more feet was drilled was water secured, the drill, however not having passed through this great sand strata. The drilling tools were removed and Mr. Taylor put in his pump, but after pumping out a great deal of water the well is found useless for domestic purposes on account of its being impregnated with oil, which forms a thin scum on the surface of the water after it is left standing a few minutes. Mr. Taylor will sink this well another 100 feet or until he penetrates this peculiar sand or shale formation when it is thought he will either strike oil, coal or gas. This sand formation is said by those who know, to be identical to the sand found in the famous oil wells of Wilson county, Kansas. Developments are awaited with interest.

COLLAPSE OF FLUME BRIDGE

While carpenters were at work repairing or preparing to rebuild the long span of the bridge which supports the big Booth-Kelly flume across the river at Saginaw Monday evening, the structure suddenly collapsed carrying several men to the bottom of the river, some of whom were injured quite severely and it seems a miracle that all were not killed outright or drowned, as the water is very deep under this bridge.

Interesting News in Brief of the City, County and State---Civil Service Examination for Forest Rangers---Big Logs.

The steel girders for the Lawson brick arrived today.

Misses Harnes & McGee have moved their millinery store into the Hemenway toggery room in the Postoffice building.

W. T. Kayser is having his drays all rebuilt and repaired preparatory to the heavy fall hauling. Spriggs Bros. & Terrill are doing the work.

The Booth-Kelly Lumber Co. has been building a mile extension of their logging railroad above Wendling. The road is already nearly six miles long.

H. O. Thompson and son Mark, have returned home from a visit to the Seattle Exposition and a visit with Mr. Thompson's relatives in Washington.

From a cherry tree near Hillsboro 1500 pounds of cherries were sold for \$18, purchasers picking, and the family used all they wished. This tree has been in bearing 25 years.

Miss Bessie Woods has just completed a six days tour of Yellowstone Park with a distinguished company of Colorado friends of the family. She will return home in time to begin teaching in the high school next Monday morning.

A civil service examination for Forest Rangers will be held in Roseburg, Oregon, on October 25 and 26, 1909. Those desiring to take this examination should apply at once to the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., for an application blank, or for other information to S. C. Bartram, Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon. The examination will be along thoroughly practical lines, and will consist of questions regarding uses of the National Forests. All persons between the ages of 21 and 40 will be eligible.

A. S. Powell and A. W. Shortridge of the Fashion Livery Stables last week purchased the Commercial Stables of Alva Wise and Fred Churchill. Mr. Churchill will remain with Messrs. Powell & Shortridge indefinitely, while Mr. Wise will look for another investment.

A remarkable shipment of big Oregon logs will be loaded on board the steamship Emma S. Dollar at Portland this week. The logs are very large, being 105 feet long and 40 feet in circumference. There are 24 of the big sticks and they are being consigned to China, where they will be used to rebuild the temple Ling Yen, the most famous house of worship in all China. The Chinese government purchased them here for the purpose. They will be rafted up the Grand Canal in China for 200 miles and taken overland six miles to the temple. The only possible way to get the big sticks this distance is for coolies to carry them on their backs. This seems impossible but it is actually done in China in transporting big timber over mountain trails, as will be done in this case.

PEARY ALSO DISCOVERS MUCH SOUGHT POLE.

St. Johns, N. F. Sept. 6.—Commander Peary has just telegraphed the governor of Newfoundland by wireless from Indian Harbor, Labrador, announcing that he has discovered the north pole and congratulating New Foundland on its part in the discovery, as the captain and crew of Peary's steamer are New Foundlanders. He certainly worked hard enough to get there, even if Dr. Cook was there first, and it was another wonderful achievement. It is said a year may have completely obliterated all traces of Dr. Cook's visit to the pole as there is no land there. Peary a Year Behind Cook.

New York, Sept. 6.—Peary announces April 6, 1909, as the date of his reaching the north pole in the following dispatch to the New York Times:

Indian Harbor via Cape Ray, N. F. Sept. 6.—I reached the pole on April 6. Expect to arrive at Chateau Bay Sept. 7. Secure control of the wire for me and prepare to expedite the transmission of a big story. (Signed) "PEARY."
