PINAFORE WAS A DECIDED HIT

Comic Opera Given by
Local Talent Was
Well Attended

With less than two weeks of strenuous rehearsals Gilbert and Sullivan's brightest and best comic opera, "H. M. S. Pinafore," was presented Tuesday and Wednesday evenings to large and appreciative audiences in the Armory theatre by local talent under the able and efficient directions of Prof. Martin E. Robinson, of Chicago, well-known in this city through his strong productions of "Belshazzar" and "Queen Esther" some time ago, "Pinafore" being generally declared better than either of the former productions here, both of which were excellent, however. One never tires of this comic opera and its rendition this week was most enjoyable. The big cast and chorus was of more than ordinary merit as regards the range and quality of the voices possessed by the participants. The stage, representing the quarter deck of the old English naval ship Pinafore, and the billowy blue ocean back ground was most realistic, while the "Jackies" in their natty uniforms of the various ranks; Sir Joseph, in his gorgeous satin uniform, Capt. Corcoran in full dress uniform and the ladies in their white, blue and red costumes presented a most attractive and charming appearance, in full harmony with the general surroundings. It is only fitting that brief mention be made of some of the leading talent in this charming naval musical plot. Dr. J. O. Van Winkle as First Lord of Admiralty, wore the honors of his exalted position with becoming dignity and handled all of his vocal solo, duet and dialogue work in a most pleasing manner. C. Morton Hadley, of Roseburg, as Captain Corcoran was an ideal commander and his rendition of the beautiful solos and duets assigned to this role was most excellent, his singing being equal to many professionals heard in this city. Fred G. Conley, as Ralph Rackstraw, the hero lover, was a trifle serious, but he admirably sustained his difficult part nevertheless, he having a good tenor voice of considerable range. Ren Sanford portrayed "Dick Deadeye" as sly an old mischief-making tar as ever escaped swinging from the yard arm. There is much dry comedy in this role, which Ren brought out in a most improved fashion. Ed Finnerty acted the part of Boatswain in a very creditable manner and took his baritone solos with more ease than it required on his part to discipline Dick Deadeye. "Josephine" the captain's daughter, as interpreted by Miss Jordan Lilly, was all that could be desired. Miss Lilly has a clear, sweet soprano voice, which she controls admirably and she displayed a grace and womanly dignity that was most becoming to the difficult character assigned to her. Her every appearance was most pleasing to the audience. Mrs. Horace Cochran was an ideal "Hebe" supplying much mirth for the audience by her extravagant mimicry of Sir Joseph. She also

scored a hit in her refrain respecting the Admiral's "sisters, his cousins and his aunts." Mrs. J. O. Van Winkle in the best of voice and unique costume, lent additional charm to the pleasing character, "Little Buttercup," emphasizing the serio-comic phases of the role, a particular pleasing feature being the reading of the Captain's palm and the duet which followed. Miss Jessie Berg passed through the trying ordeal of piano accompanist in a most skillful manner and again won the gratitude of the local singers as well as that of Prof. Robinson. The ladies chorus, "Over the Bounding Sea," sung in "Sir Joseph's Barge" behind the scene was grand. The scene altogether was so realistic that one could imagine he could almost see the porpoises sporting amid the wild waves as the "Pinafore" ploughed through the foamy billows. One missed the armor plate and equipment of the present day battleship, but it must be remembered, that when the "Pinafore" was launched, the big gun and still bigger turret of the modern battleships were unsolved problems.

The door receipts were fully up to expectations, owing to the hop picking season, and Company E under auspices of which the opera was given, realized a neat little sum, which will assist them materially in keeping up the expenses of their well equipped armory. The Leader congratulates Prof. Robinson and every member of the chorus and cast upon the success attending the presentation of "Pinafore," Cottage Grove's first comic opera.

HARRIMAN'S DEATH NOW CONFIRMED

Arden, Sept. 9.—Edward H. Harriman, the greatest organizer of railroads the world has ever known, met the only lasting defeat of his active life today at the hands of death. Secluded in his magnificent home on Tower Hill, he succumbed to an intestinal disorder this afternoon, after a fight against disease that will rank for sheer grit with his remarkable struggles in the financial world.

DISCREPANCY AS TO TIME.

The exact time of his death is known only in that limited circle of relatives and associates who had shielded Mr. Harriman from all outside annoyance during his last illness. The time was given out as 3:35 p. m., but Mrs. Mary Simonds, sister of the dead man said tonight that Mr. Harriman died at 1:30 p. m. Whether this apparent discrepancy has any bearing on the current belief that every effort was made to lesson the influence of the financier's death on the New York stock market is problematical. But it is significant that the time of his death as officially announced, was just 35 minutes after trading had ceased on the New York exchange.

MIND CLEAR TO LAST.

Mr. Harriman died peacefully and to the end his mind retained its clearness. After a relapse on Sunday he sank slowly and soon after noon today there came a relapse that marked the approach of the end. His wife, two daughters and two sons, who have been constantly with him, assembled at the bedside. Mrs. Simonds entered the great silent home in time to be present at her brother's death. She joined the wife and children, who, with Dr. W. G. Lyle, of New York, and Orlando Harriman, a brother, and the nurses, formed a group at the bedside.

No spiritual adviser was at hand. Rev. Dr. J. Holmes McGuinness, of Arden Parish, hurried to Arden

WHEN THE PRESIDENT VISITS US.

President Taft will be made the center of a big demonstration when he comes to Portland October 2. There will be no private entertaining for the big president, but he will be in view of the public throughout his visit. There will be a big parade in the president's honor, in which he will ride, where he may be seen by the thousands who want to have a look at the nation's executive. President Taft will be asked to make an address at the armory in the afternoon and attend a banquet at the Commercial Club at night on October 2nd. Plans for Sunday, which will be spent in Portland, are not made yet, but the President will probably attend church and spend the remainder of the day resting. Mayor Simon has named a prominent committee of Portland people to arrange the President's entertainment.

THE FUNERAL.

Mr. Harriman will be placed at rest in the family plot at the little graveyard behind St. John's Episcopal church at Arden. He will rest beside his eldest son, Edward H. Harriman, Jr., who died 22 years ago, soon after the family first came to Arden. The services will be held at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, and, it is understood, will be strictly private.

Harriman's death comes at a time when the business affairs of the country are in excellent condition. It is believed by Harriman's associates that the railroad system which he organized and carried to such a degree of perfection will be continued with practically no change of policy, and that plans to that end were perfected by Harriman long before his death. Estimates of Harriman's personal property vary between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

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
