### A CLEVER MAN WITH A RIFLE

Captain George E. Bartlett, ex-United States marshal and scout, known among the Sioux Indians of the Dakotas as "Wounded Knee," will shoot up the town here Thursday, Sept. 23rd. He is a bad man with a gun.

He isn't one of the bad men, however, who shoot just for pure cussedness, but he is one of the very few men in the world who can shoot a rifle without missing the object shot at, even though the object be as small as the shadow of a mosquito's eyebrow. The captain is the coast representative of the Peters Cartridge Company and the exhibitions he gives are for the purpose of demonstrating the superiority of the cartridges made by his company and the different kinds of powder used.

After a preliminary, and very instructive talk on the various kinds of powder and cartridges used, the captain proceeds to demonstrate. Using a Remington auto-loading rifle shooting 30-30 cartridges, he first shoots at pieces of brick thrown in the air and the pieces reduced to powder. He shoots at a quart tin can filled with water and sealed, thrown in the air, and the bullet strikes the can square in the end and reduces it to a scrap of tin, while the water disappears in thin vapor. Some pieces of boiler plate about an inch and a half square and a quarter of an inch thick, thrown into the air, and the 30-30 bullets bores clean holes through them as though they were putty. With a 32-20 semi-smokeless cartridge, using a Stevens Ideal Rifle, he does some pretty work in reflection shooting, and with the use of a small mirror, hits objects without looking at them, holding the gun in many different positions. He then gives a demonstration with a 22-calibre rifle. The demonstration concludes with an exhibition of shotgun shooting at which the captain shows himself to be as expert as with the rifle. He fills the magazine of a Remington auto-loading gun with mixed shells of semi-smokeless and different grades of nitro powders, and shoots at tin cans and other objects thrown in the air. Remember he will be here and shoot Thursday, 1:30 o'clock Sept. 23rd.

### ENGLAND LAW NOT DELAYED.

Much has been written and said concerning the prompt execution of the laws in England. Here we have two examples, one quite expedient, the other dilatory and expensive:

On the night of July 1st last, Madaral Dhinagari, an Indian student, brought himself into international notoriety by assassinating Lieutenant-Colonel Curzon-Wyllie and Dr. Cawai Lalcaea, in the city of London.

July 23, 22 days later, Dhinagari was found guilty of his crime at the Old Bailey court in just one hour.

On the morning of August 17, about six weeks later, he was hanged at Pentonville prison.

No one questions that the defendant was not given every chance to justify himself. British law is proverbially equitable.

Yet there was no legal red tape, no endless and exasperating technicalities, no obvious playing for time.

The courts discharged their only legitimate function—that of arbitrating the guilt or innocence of the accused in accordance with the evidence.

Had the crime occurred in this country, in all likelihood it would have been several months, perhaps years, before justice hewed away the mass of technicality and claimed vindication.—Atlanta Constitution.

#### LONDON GRAFFERS GUILTY.

London, Aug. 7.—Ten municipal officers of Mile End parish charged with grafting were convicted tonight after a trial lasting a month. Although the amounts involved were small, the case excited the greatest interest because trials on such charges are unusual in England. Thirty lawyers were engaged and the cost of the trial is estimated at \$50,000.—Oregonian.

#### The Wheat Crop in Alberta.

S. Y. Evans came in from Alberta Tuesday evening to attend to business matters. He reports the wheat crop in Canada in his section of Alberta almost harvested, and a good yield. When he got off the train at Highbridge he says he saw thousands of acres of wheat which was frost bitten and was told that the same condition existed in Calgary the next district north and very little of the wheat will be cut. He was delighted to find that the condition did not exist in and around Lethbridge where he has his farming interests with other Eugene people. He has 100 acres of wheat, which was just about all harvested when he left and expects to have about 30 to 35 bushels per acre. He leaves in a few days for southern Alberta again and will put in 2000 acres of wheat next year. Some of it this fall and the remainder next spring. He still swears by the Lethbridge section of Alberta.—Guard.
