The poultry exhibit at the Eugene District Fair included only 180 birds. Cottage Grove's poultry exhibit at our District fair last fall comprised 350 birds and at the last annual poultry show almost 600 birds. Verily Cottage Grove is the Petaluma of Oregon.

Mr. John S. Barnett, has been appointed district manager for the Continental Casualty Co., of Chicago, with headquarters at Cottage Grove, taking the place of A. H. Nichols, who has been local agent. This is the largest of the accidental insurance companies of the United States. I. J. Walcott, general agent for Lane county, with office at Eugene, was in Cottage Grove Monday and personally attended to this transfer.

Bran \$1.50 per hundred pounds at Flour Mill.

Dr. W. W. Oglesby says the specimen of rare evergreen tree from the Bohemia mines on display in this office is not the silver, but the royal fir. Commenting on an article on Lang creek and the assertion that it heads in Bohemia the doctor says the mouth of Lang creek is a good deal nearer Bohemia than its source is. The fact is Lang Creek heads up against Mt. June, north of Bohemia, and is fed from snow caverns and crevices most of the year. The doctor also depreciates the talk about \$500 or \$600 being adequate to construct a reserve dam in Lang creek 50 feet high. The 22 foot dam of the West Coast Mining Co. in Bohemia which is constructed in a narrow gorge, he says, cost \$20,000. Just as well face a few facts as we go along.

Rolled barley \$1.25 a sack at the Flour Mill.

The grafting, contemptible methods of the Wells-Fargo Express Company is again brought to attention in the shipments of poultry for exhibition purposes to the state fair from this city. Most poultrymen send birds to the state fair show with the intention of selling them if possible, as they always command a fancy price there from the fact that they come under the head of show birds and many are valuable prize winners. Now, when the poultryman goes to the Wells-Fargo express office to ship his birds to the fair he is informed that he must pay a double rate to the fair and one-third rate return. Herein is where the graft is apparent, as few of the birds are ever shipped back home, the poultryman therefore pays for transportation services which he does not receive. The small light cloth covered coops containing five birds each, shipped from Cottage Grove to Salem cost the shippers an average of \$1.80 each express charges to Salem, and they were politely informed the charge would only be about 30 to 50 cents on the return shipment, but this had little soothing effect upon the shippers for as stated above, many of the poultrymen sell their birds during the course of the exhibit, and are simply out the express rate which they advanced. This is an imposition forced upon the shippers.
