his native state, with other missionaries around the "Horn" and lauded at Ft. Astoria in 1850. He paid \$20 for transportation up the Columbia river to what is now Portland and preached the second sermon in Portland's first church. He was married in Oregon to his present wife 53 years ago, she having crossed the plains with an ox team caravan in 1852. Eight children have been born to them, six of whom are living. Father Flynn has had a remarkable and useful career in Oregon and Washington and was a powerful factor for good in the pioneer days of the great northwest, which he has seen converted from a wilderness to two great, rich, populous and progressive commonwealths. His work among the natives and later in evangelistic circles is worthy of the highest commendation. He is accompanied on his visit to Cottage Grove by his venerable wife, who in age is well advanced in the eighties, and is even more spry than her aged husband, both of whom are taking an active interest in all of the sessions of the Methodist conference.

COMMERCIAL CLUB'S TREAT.

A most pleasant and enjoyable feature of the conference was the splendid treat tendered the many conference members and guests at the close of the Thursday afternoon session by the Cottage Grove Commercial Club. A wagon load of fine musk and water melons were taken to the city park and the ministers, their wives and the laymen marched to this pleasant shaded retreat and feasted upon the melons of which there was enough and to spare. The Bishop and his cabinet were conveyed to the park in an automobile and they entered into the festivities and spirit of the occasion, which served as recreation and relaxation from the strenuous conference routine. During the half hour in the park pretty young ladies of the public and high school pinned a nice ribbon badge on the lapel of each visitor's coat, bearing the inscription on one side, "M. E. Conference, Cottage Grove, Sept. 15-20, 1909," and on the other "Compliments of Cottage Grove Commercial Club, Nesmith county 1910." After the melon feast, felicitous speeches were made by Father Flynn, Drs. Young, C. T. Willson and J. W. McDougall of Portland; Dr. Sallet of Salem; Rev. Trimball of Eugene, and F. G. Conley, manager Cottage Grove Commercial club, the whole, concluding with three rousing cheers for Cottage Grove and "Nesmith" county as suggested by Dr. Young of Portland. It was a mark of generosity on the part of the Commercial club, which was greatly appreciated by the visitors, all of whom expressed admiration for the enterprise and public spirit of Cottage Grove and its worthy cause, the creation of "Nesmith county."

This morning's session was largely taken up with the examination and admission of young or new ministers to this conference among whom were A. F. Lacy, C. L. Cressy and Jos. Knotts, who will be ordained Sunday at 3 o'clock p. m.
