ROSEBURG-COOS BAY ROAD

Option Given on Right-of-
Way--Work to Begin
By July 1910

Marshfield, Or., Oct. 8.—The contract has been closed giving F. A. Clarke, attorney, an option on the survey and rights of way of the Coos Bay, Oregon & Idaho railroad. They are, in consideration of receiving the option, to start actual construction on the road by July 1, 1910 and have the road completed to Roseburg within two years. In case they want to bond the road they must pay off in full the original subscribers who put up the money with which the first survey work was done.

The promoters will at once start to continue the survey to Roseburg.

VETERANS ENJOY WATERMELON TREAT

CEMENT WALKS THE ORDER

Permanent Improvements
on Many Prominent
Home Streets

Rex Gleason has just completed more than 200 feet of regulation concrete sidewalk for J. F. Spray, fronting his residence on east Main street opposite the city park. Mr. Spray has also had concrete walks laid about his residence. His home has been enlarged and modernized recently.

Mr. Gleason will commence work tomorrow on 120 feet of concrete sidewalk fronting the residence lot of F. B. Phillips on Wall street, which will connect with the new concrete walk recently completed for Newt Jones, which gives that part of Wall street between D and E a full block of concrete sidewalk.

W. F. Hart, Joe Baker and Geo. Hawley are other Wall street residents who have completed concrete sidewalks in front of their residence property, and O. H. Kem and J. M. Comer have completed fills recently fronting their property on Wall street preparatory to laying over 300 feet of concrete sidewalk. They have already completed their concrete curbing.

Miss Jessie Berg's pretty home on B street has also recently been surrounded with concrete sidewalks an evidence that the young ladies of this city are not wanting in enterprise and civic pride.

The city council has just had the grade established for the construction of cement sidewalks on both sides of Main street from the S. P. railroad to the river.

FRUIT GROWING INDUSTRY

Ideal Apple Orchard Land
and Thrifty, Fruitful
Young Orchards

Bales Brothers who have a tract of 14 acres set to choice winter apples in Row river valley ten miles east of this city, only part of which is mature, picked and boxed 740 boxes of choice apples last week for which they are offered from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per box in this city. The Messrs Bales have placed some of their apples picked at random on display in the Leader office window these apples including Baldwins, Jonathans, Mammoth Black Twig and Russets, one Baldwin measuring 22 inches in circumference and weighing 2 1/4 pounds, being the largest Baldwin we have ever heard of. The other apples in the exhibit are very fine in quality and size and fully demonstrates the fact that with intelligent cultivation and care this part of Lane county cannot be excelled for apple growing.

THE JONES ORCHARD.

The Cottage Grove correspondent of the Oregonian has the following to say regarding the growing fruit industry about this city:

J. I. Jones has 45 acres of fruit trees planted, joining the city limits of Cottage Grove, 15 acres are planted in Spitzenbergs and 15 in Yellow Newtown Pippins 3 years old. An expert California fruit-grower recently examined his orchard, having on the same trip visited the Southern Oregon and Hood River orchards and pronounced this orchard to be in the best state of preservation of any he had seen in the state. Fruit trees in large tracts are also being planted on other farms in this vicinity.

LORANE FRUIT ENTERPRISE.

Reuben Phillips, of Toronto, Canada, was here last week arranging for locating his family, preparatory to taking charge of extensive fruit enterprises in Lane county. Nearly the whole of Lorane valley, located 12 miles west of here, has been purchased by eastern capital. The rich grain and meadow fields are to be transformed into a solid fruit belt. Many thousands of dollars will be spent in preparation and planting, aside from the original cost of the land. Mr. Phillips is an experienced fruit raiser and will start the work about the middle of this month with 40 men and 12 teams. The company sent expert men here several months ago to make a thorough investigation as to the fitness of the soil and the climate conditions and secured options on many tracts.

BIG MONEY IN WINTER PEARS

F. H. Hopkins of Medford, has sold his entire crop of Winter Nelis pears at an average of \$3.12 a box f. o. b. New York, which will net him \$2.14. From 16 1/2 acres of pears he will probably have 7000 boxes, so for this block he will gross \$1325. An acre of pears approximately \$15,000. The same pears in 1907 produced \$19,000 net.

Four hundred and forty, seven-year-old Bartlett pear trees at Medford produced 1489 boxes of fruit.

Senator Bourne has just bought thirty boxes of Medford Comice pears at \$9 a box.
