### THE WATER QUESTION.

On Wednesday the legal voters of Cottage Grove will be called upon to vote on the question of authorizing the common council to issue and sell bonds not to exceed \$100,000, these bonds to run 25 years and to bear interest at 5 per cent, the purpose of issuing these bonds being the construction of a pipe line from Lang Creek to Cottage Grove to secure an increased municipal water supply. The plan seems not only a worthy but a perfectly feasible and practical one, from the fact that the city has outgrown its present water facilities and supply, and a town without an ample supply of good, pure water is seriously handicapped in its growth and development, while on the other hand an abundance of pure water is a great attraction to home builders, and the "home beautiful," or "city beautiful" cannot become a reality without plenty of good pure water.

Cottage Grove is in sore need of more water. Lang Creek affords

an adequate supply of pure cold water from a fountainhead of perpetual snow, for not only the present needs, but an ample supply for a generation to come. It is the only available supply of pure cold water adequate to the present and future requirements of Cottage Grove and there remains but one alternative for every thoughtful, loyal, public spirited citizen, and that is the voting of the proposed water bonds on Wednesday. The Leader looks upon this proposition as one of vital importance to Cottage Grove and one upon which hinges, to a considerable degree, the future welfare of our citizens as well as the growth and development of Cottage Grove. Vote for Lang Creek water.

### A LIBERAL PROPOSITION.

C. M. Shinn of the local light and power company, upon his return home from a trip to Portland recently, informed the Leader he observed that many of the enterprising and progressive towns between Cottage Grove and the metropolis, including Creswell, our neighbor on the north, had erected large sign-boards or arches plainly lettered with appropriate matter pertaining to their particular advantages, resources and opportunities afforded capital for investment, facing their respective depots. Mr. Shinn, and Mr. Kem also, commend this publicity innovation and state that if the Cottage Grove Commercial Club will erect an arch or suitable sign-board across the street at the local Southern Pa-

cific depot, they will light it up brilliantly at night free of cost to the club and city. The Leader considers this a very public spirited suggestion and a most liberal proposition on the part of Messrs Kem and Shinn. A frame work arch across Main street at the depot properly lettered and bearing a "Welcome to homeseekers and investors" also exploiting our mines, timber and agricultural resources, would be a grand booster advertisement for the town and country and a small "promotion fund" well spent. Think it over.

The Albany Democrat pays our esteemed townsman, J. W. Baker, the following high compliment: "Linn county will pay nearly \$2500 this year to the game and fish wardens, and there ought to be something doing all along the line. Oregon needs J. W. Baker for state warden. Baker was worth a dozen of the present state game warden, according to the opinion heard by the Democrat. An enormous sum is being paid in Oregon for something. What?" W. M., within the Umpqua National Forest, Oregon; estimated to be 167,015,000 feet B. M. of live Douglas fir; 2,480,000 feet B. M. of live western hemlock; 2,945,000 feet B. M. of live western red and incense cedar; 265,000 feet B. M. of live sugar and western yellow pine and 1,105,000 feet B. M. of merchantable dead timber, more or less. No bid of less than \$2 per thousand feet B. M. for all species, live and dead, will be considered and a deposit of \$5,000 payable to the order of the First National bank of Portland, Oregon, must be sent to that bank for each bid submitted to the District Forester.
