RIFLE COMPETITION OF FOURTH INFANTRY.

The following general orders have been issued for the coming annual rifle shoot of the Fourth Infantry, O. N. G.:

"General Orders No. 11—

"I. The annual rifle competition of the Fourth Infantry, O. N. G., will be held at the stations of the several companies on the following dates:

"Co. B, Ashland, Tuesday, Oct. 26.

"Co. D, Roseburg, Wednesday, Oct. 27.

"Co. E, Cottage Grove, Thursday, Oct. 28.

"Co. A, Eugene, Friday, Oct. 29.

"Co. C, Eugene, Saturday, Oct. 30.

"Co. F, McMinnville, Tuesday, Nov. 2.

"Co. H, Dallas, Wednesday, Nov. 3.

"Co. G, Albany, Saturday, Nov. 6.

"II The Regimental Trophy contest will be for teams of four men from each company. The medal contest will be open to eight men from each company. Ranges: 200 yards, slow; 200, rapid; 500 and 600 yards. Two sighting and ten record shots at each range.

"III Firing will begin at each station at 9:00 a. m. Company commanders will detail four men for scorers and markers, to report to the range at the time for the beginning of the contest.

CRESWELL DEPOT ROBBED SATURDAY

The depot thieves who have been moving south seem to get about everything they want. On Saturday night between midnight and morning thieves broke a pane of glass out of the Creswell depot, crawled in and after securing an ax from the freight room they pried the till of the company open and also that of the Wells Fargo Express company and secured about \$63 in cash and a bunch of keys. They broke open several express packages lying in the depot but the contents were not to their liking and they took nothing. The sheriff can find no clue to the robbery.

No bid of less than \$2 per thousand feet B.
