GOOD ADVICE ON FRUIT RAISING

"Commercial growers should plant few varieties. For an orchard of, say 30 acres, perhaps not more than three varieties should be selected. Large blocks of one variety are to be avoided, on account of pollination. Plant for a succession. For instance, to harvest 30 acres of Bartlett pears, we will say, will take 15 men for 10 days; but to harvest 30 acres planted to three different varieties which ripen in succession, will take one-third the number of men to do the work. A better grade of help can thus be secured, because the job lasts longer and the grower can handle the smaller crew to better advantage, besides much less packing-house room and equipment will be needed.

"The following high class commercial pears appear to grow to perfection here: Bartlett, DeAnjou, Winter Nellis and no doubt, Howell, Bosc and Comice will do as well. All of these are good shippers and good sellers.

"The Spitz is perhaps our most profitable commercial apple. However, the Newtown is showing up royally this season. It has the advantage of being a more regular cropper and you don't have to color it. Winesap colors well, bears well and is a good seller when well grown.

"Set one-year trees of medium size. An over-grown tree is as undesirable as a runt. Head low, not over 24 inches from the ground; 12 or 15 inches is best for peaches. Prepare the ground thoroughly before planting.

"Subsoil, if possible. If a hardpan is found or water is inclined to stand on the surface, it is well to explode a stick of dynamite about three feet below the surface where each tree is to be set. An orchard well started is half grown. The rows should be set absolutely straight in all directions, as it adds largely to the beauty and value of the orchard.

"The distance at which trees should be set depends largely upon the quality of the soil; ordinarily, peaches should not be less than 18 feet; pears, 24 feet; apples and sweet cherries, 30 feet and over."

A Portland newspaper inquires: "Would not development of the community be more rapid and satisfactory if the idle acres were made over into comfortable small farm homes?" Granted, and the same is just as applicable to the great undeveloped counties of Oregon including Lane and Douglas which be divided and a new county or two created.

OAT YIELD IN COQUILLE VALLEY

The Coquille Sentinel has proof positive that the Coquille valley is as well adapted to raising small grain as it is to growing magnificent crops of vegetables, fruits, grasses and so forth. This proof is contained in the fact that the first shipment of oats from the valley has been made to Portland, it consisting of 32 tons of first class seed oats grown by H. L. Stephens in the Fishtrap section. Mr. Stephens raised 38 acres of the grain, from which he has harvested 4,300 bushels, nine acres of the crop yielding at the rate of 135 bushels to the acre. Eastern farmers who are accustomed to raise 25 to 50 bushels to the acre may be inclined to doubt this statement but the crop is here to show for itself, and after they have been here for a while they will not doubt almost any story regarding the productiveness of Coquille valley soil.

The Leader editor has resided in the Coquille valley and knows the above figures are not overdrawn, but valley or bottom land sells over there at from \$100 to \$500 per acre and is generally considered more valuable for clover and alfalfa than grain crops, dairying being the chief industry in the farming communities.
