DIED.

BROCK—In his private apartments in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Hohl in this city at midnight Saturday Oct. 31, 1909, Judge C. C. Brock, aged 61 years, 6 months and 25 days, of paralysis.

Cyrus C. Brock was born at Brock, Pennsylvania, April 6, 1848, in which state he grew to manhood and received a college education and was graduated from a prominent law school. For 35 years he followed his profession with success in Pittsburg, practicing in the various courts of the state and in several instances appeared before the United States Supreme Court at Washington, D. C. One peculiar provision in Mr. Brock's long years of law practice, was his refusal to take either a criminal or divorce case, such cases being invariably passed up to his professional associates as personal cases. He was very conscientious and scrupulously honest, and a man of great intellect and good sound judgment. He was a genial and courteous gentleman and made many friends. He first came to Oregon in November 1906, and remained a short time a guest of his daughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. D. J. DuBrulle at Albany. He returned to Pittsburg but came back to Oregon July 22, 1907, to visit with his daughter Mrs. DuBrulle, who with her husband, daughter and little son had become residents of Cottage Grove in the meantime. He was greatly attached to his little grandson, the only male descendant of the family, and he fitted up apartments here that he might enjoy daily frolics with little Lewis Brock DuBrulle, his greatly admired grandchild. He was stricken with paralysis on July 22, 1909 just two years from the day he arrived in Cottage Grove, and despite the efforts of the local medical profession and tenderest care given him by his daughter and Mrs. Hohl, his case became more obstinate from time to time until the end came, he however, suffering very little pain and his death being little less than a release into a peaceful slumber. His wife died 34 years ago and was buried at Waynesburg, Penn. where his remains, after being embalmed by the local undertaker, will be taken for burial. The aged mother of deceased who died only one year ago is also buried at the above-mentioned place. Mrs. DuBrulle and daughter Miss Gail, will accompany the remains to Pennsylvania. Mr. DuBrulle and son remaining here with a sister Mrs. Rees, after a brief trip as far as Portland with the other members of the family. Mr. Brock had amassed a large fortune, a portion of which is the old Brock homestead at Brock, Pennsylvania. He leaves but two children, Mrs. D. J. DuBrulle of this city and Miss Ida M. Brock of Pittsburg, Pa. He also has seven brothers residing in Pennsylvania. Mrs. DuBrulle and other members of the family have the sincere sympathy of their Cottage Grove friends in their sad bereavement. The remains will be shipped east from Cottage Grove this Tuesday evening.
