Died.

CHANEY—At the home on Fourth street, Nov. 30, 1909, Lee Franklin Chaney, aged 30 years, of consumption.

Mr. Chaney was born at Middleton, Idaho, Dec. 3, 1879. He was a graduate of the Presbyterian college at Caldwell, Idaho, and was a member of the Baptist church. He engaged for some time in the hotel business in Idaho and a few years ago contracted a severe case of pneumonia fever, which finally developed into consumption. He came to this city last season and for some time past has been living in a tent on Fourth street. He was on the streets Tuesday, but late Tuesday evening suffered a hemorrhage from which he died suddenly. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Chaney of Idaho, were with him at the time of his death. Brief services were held at the home on Fourth street Wednesday by Rev. S. C. Adams after which the remains were shipped to the old Idaho home at Middleton for burial, being accompanied by the parents and wife of deceased.

The Leader learns that besides a father and mother, deceased leaves a sorrowing widow. He was a very exemplary young man and during his brief residence here made many friends who are grieved at his untimely death.
