San Francisco, Dec. 22.—The Order of Railway Employees, which it is announced has a membership of thirty thousand on the Pacific coast, has been organized and hereafter will be in charge of railroad men in actual service. Louis H. Ledger of the Santa Fe system is supreme conductor; Samuel P. Veatch of the Southern Pacific, supreme treasurer, and A. Lindsey, of San Francisco, secretary. The reorganization has been re-affected as a preliminary step in the campaign by which is planned to bring practically every man in the western states into the membership. The order will be administered through local lodges called divisions.

(Sam Veatch is a well known S. P. conductor who has been on the Portland-Roseburg run for many years. His parents Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Veatch reside at Cottage Grove, where he was raised.)

LUMBER PRICE WILL ADVANCE NEXT MONTH

Aberdeen, Wash., Dec. 21.—The Evening World today says that owing to the shortage of logs which will soon be apparent as the result of high water and closed camps, the lumbermen of the Grays Harbor country predict sharp increase in lumber prices sometime in January.

The lumber mills of Aberdeen will close on Friday until January 3rd.
