Died.

LOCKWOOD—At the home of his son, Ernest, in Cottage Grove, Christmas eve Dec. 24, 1909, Samuel Godfrey Lockwood, aged 69 years, 11 months and 14 days of cancer.

Deceased was born in Orange county, New York, Jan. 7, 1840.

He moved to Wisconsin in early boyhood and in August 1862 enlisted in Co. G, Twentieth Wisconsin Regiment and served two years during which time he was severely wounded in battle at Prairie Grove, Arkansas. He re-enlisted in Feb. 1864 in Co. D 36th Wisconsin Regiment and served as a sergeant until the close of the war, being wounded a second time at Cold Harbor, Va., by a gun shot wound in both legs. He was mustered out in June 1865, and during the latter part of the year was married to Ellen L. Petrie and in 1872 moved to California where he founded the town of Central City now known as Santa Maria. With his family he came to Oregon in 1880, since which time he has resided in this county and was Cottage Grove's first dealer in farm implements, from which business he retired a good many years ago and settled on a farm in the Lorane valley, 12 miles west of Cottage Grove. He has long been an honored member of Appomattox Post G. A. R. of Cottage Grove, which organization conducted its ritualistic services over the remains of deceased at the undertaking parlors in this city Sunday afternoon, the remains then being taken to Lorane for burial in the family plat at that place, Monday forenoon Dec. 27, at 11 o'clock.

Mrs. Lockwood, wife of deceased died Oct. 31, 1902, and their remains now rest side by side in the Lorane cemetery.

They are survived by seven children, three sons and four daughters, among whom are Ernest Lockwood, Mrs. C. W. Wallace, Misses Ursula and Gertrude Lockwood of this city; W. P. Lockwood, of Seattle, Washington; S. G. Lockwood of Tonapah, Nev., and Miss Flossie Lockwood of Tacoma, Washington.
