

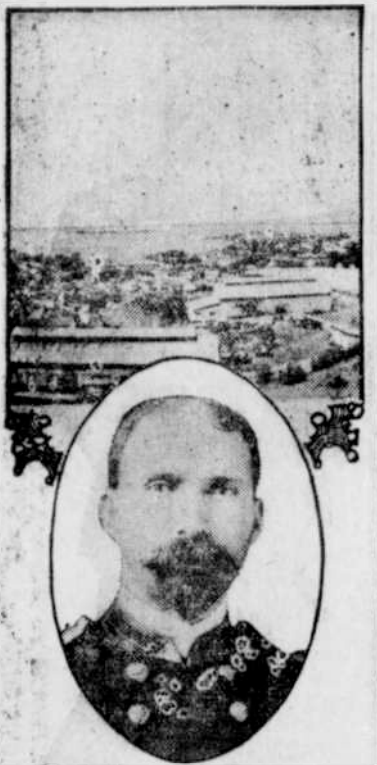
AMERICA PLANS A GIBRALTAR

Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, is Site to Be Inspected by Capps.

The United States government has practically abandoned its idea of establishing a powerful naval base in the Philippines, and Chief Naval Constructor Washington L. Capps is going to the far east to pass upon a number of sites tentatively selected.

The navy yard at Cavite, in Manila harbor—the original selection for the American Gibraltar—does not contain enough water for the purpose, and the station at Olongapo, on Subig bay, will be a mere repair station, as it cannot be made impregnable.

But it is essential that the United States should have a strong oriental

station, and, while Pearl Harbor is likely to be the selection, it will not mean the abandonment of Olongapo as a plant where the American Pacific fleet can put in for repairs. The report of the constructor will determine the amount of the appropriation which will be asked of congress.

When his work in the Philippines is concluded the chief constructor will return to the United States by way of Europe, taking advantage of the opportunity to make a thorough study of recent developments in naval construction in the great navy yards of the European maritime powers. Incidentally he is also to look into the development of the aeroplane for naval use.

JOHN BIGELOW 93, BUT YOUNG

Opens Museum in Native Town and Completes Book.

John Bigelow, historian and diplomat, celebrated his ninety-third birthday recently and made a busy day of it too. Indeed, he was so busy putting the finishing touches to a new book, the concluding volume of "Retrospections of a Long Life," that he could not devote the time to receive his congratulatory friends until afternoon. At that time many notable figures gathered at the old house facing Gramercy park, New York city, close by the old home of his staunch friend Samuel J. Tilden. Letters and telegrams came from all

parts of the country congratulating the "first citizen of New York city" on his apple checked youth.

Mr. Bigelow recently completed another onslaught on the tariff—his pet aversion—entitled "Building Temples of Peace With Untempered Mortar," and also opened the Bigelow museum at Malden, N. Y., his native town. The museum, a gift of the aged author, is also a library and lecture hall. The nucleus of the library consists of historical papers and books covering events contemporaneous with the diplomat's life and activities. The museum contains many memorials of Malden, which was partly founded and built up by Mr. Bigelow's father.

The nonagenarian was born Nov. 23, 1827, and was educated at Union college. He was one of the editors of the New York Evening Post from 1849 to 1861, during William Miller Bryant's regime, and was minister to France from 1864 to 1867. He has made an annual visit to France ever since and expects to repeat it next summer.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Report on Rock Crusher. Minors Must Give Up Gaming.

The city council met in regular monthly session Monday evening, all members of the board being present.

Petitions were presented asking that a short unused street never having been used in the Jones addition be declared vacated. A motion prevailed that Monday Jan. 16, be set as the date for hearing objections, if any, to vacating said street.

REPORT ON ROCK CRUSHER.

Alderman Lawson submitted a report on the operation of the city rock crusher which in brief is as follows:

Cost of crusher, total.....\$2837.88
Operating expenses to date including labor, tools, powder, wood, etc..... 2979.00
Total number yards of rock crushed 3055 1/2.

Crushed for Warren Construction Co..... 2160.00
Rock delivered to citizens 274.81
Delivered to city but not collected for, 55 yards, remaining in bins, 80 yards.....

Interest on investment for year..... 170.00

An average of about \$1 per yard was received for the crushed rock, which totals about \$3,169, hence it will be seen that the proposition comes out just about even.

CITY LIGHTS.

Councilman Hart reported on lights used in city as follows: 54 incandescents 32 candle power, and 27 arc lights.

The proposed new charter ordinance was voted laid on the table indefinitely.

Ordinance 283 was passed providing that proprietors of cigar stores, pool and billiard rooms and soft drink establishments prohibit minors from engaging in games of chance of any kind in their places and providing a penalty for violation of this ordinance of from \$5 to \$50. It is also provided that any minor who willfully represents to said proprietors that he is of age when he is not shall upon conviction become subject to a fine of from \$5 to \$50. This ordinance become in full effect immediately upon its passage. The usual monthly bills were allowed.

Big Things in Oregon

The slogan of a big successful eastern shoe company is "The time to advertise is all the time."

Four hundred boxes of Comice pears, grown near Medford, sold in the London market this season for \$10 a box.

Business decadence invariably dates from the time one is satisfied with present methods. Improvement and progress should be the watchword.

Rogue River orchardists will plant 1,500,000 pear and apple trees this season. This new planting will cover 20,000 acres and bring the total orchard acreage in that valley to 85,000.

Wallowa has a startling potato story. One vine that grew on new ground, is said to have attained the height of 6 feet, 1 inch this season, and produced 40 tubers, the total weight of the potatoes being 16 pounds.

The annual report of the Portland Union Stockyards Company shows Portland is becoming a great packing center. The value of livestock shipped the first year the concern was in operation amounted to \$8,335,000.

Lost a Fine Stallion.

The fine coach stallion "Wollenberg" owned by a company of citizens of this community died Monday at the Ernest Sears farm near Saginaw. He was about 8 years old and was valued at \$3600.

LIGHT COMPANY GETS FRANCHISE

At the special election on Wednesday called for the purpose of voting on the question of granting a twenty-five year franchise to the Cottage Grove Light & Power Co., the proposition carried by a majority of 35, divided among the wards as follows: First ward, 8; second ward 17; third ward, 10. There was not a full vote cast, only 156 ballots being registered.

The company, having the desired grant, will now make several important betterments to its system. One of the first improvements will be the stringing of a heavier copper wire from the plant along Main street, and as far as the armory. It is also the purpose of the company to make further improvements in the plant.

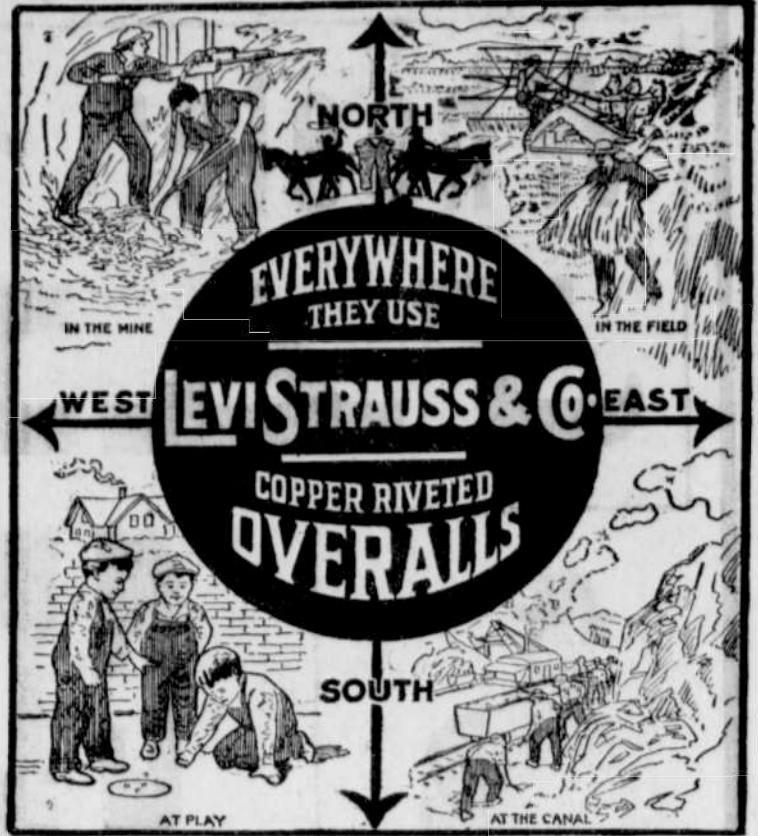
D. B. Chamberlen is still supplying Oregon breeders with first class S. S. Hamburg stock.
