ROSEBURG COMMERCIAL CLUB CAMPAIGN

The Leader likes the following declaration of policies and principles as announced by the Roseburg Commercial Club.

The county of Douglas is such a large one and its resources and opportunities are so many and varied that few people at home or abroad correctly comprehend what they are. No one knows exactly, or has a very accurate idea of, the extent of its lands suitable for fruit growing and other culture, and as a result prices vary widely. Advertising of Douglas county lands heretofore has been vague and indefinite, and the language of hyperbole has been almost exhausted. Glistening generalities and highly colored pictures have been disseminated, in many instances to the detriment of the best interests of the community. Lack of information has been the real fault of such exaggeration, and any systematic plan to accurately inform the absent investor or immediately demonstrate to the incoming visitor the opportunity that exists to develop these resources, should receive, and undoubtedly will receive, the co-operation of all who have Douglas county's advancement at heart.

The Roseburg Commercial Club has discerned this evil condition of publicity and notes with alarm the tendency to unduly embellish that is so evident in the booklets and other advertising literature of the towns of Oregon and other states. Its Publicity Committee has, therefore, come to the wise conclusion that it is best to "know your own county first," to the end that its citizens may safely advise and guide the investor in fruit lands and the intensive farmer whom it is seeking to attract. As a first move in this direction, and to establish closer relations between the business men of Roseburg and the business men of the several other towns in Douglas county, a large body of Roseburg's ablest men are arranging for a four days trip to those sections of the county that can be reached by railroad. Though but a small portion of the fertile valleys of the Umpqua River and its tributaries, necessarily, can be visited, enough can be inspected to bring a clearer conception of its horticultural and agricultural that awaits the man with a little money who will prepare and cultivate along modern, scientific lines. From this business men's excursion should result many return trips, for it is not possible that any one who comes and sees our valleys and hillsides can ignore the fact that such soil, supported by ideal climatic conditions, will in time make Douglas county the greatest apple district in the world, as has been so splendidly forecast by E. L. Smith, of Hood River, for many years president of the State Horticultural Society. —Roseburg Review.

Eugene Man's New Incubator.

The mechanism and working of the White Automatic incubator is certainly unique. The eggs are placed on trays and heat is produced by a miniature steam boiler heated with a huge metal kerosene lamp and a regular circulation of air is produced. By an automatic device, which is unique, a lid is raised in the top of the incubator box where the eggs are kept, after the heat gets above a certain point and lets the heated air pass out. This device is so sensitive that a half a degree of heat will cause it to act, so that the heat of the interior of the incubator may be regulated to a nicety. The machines have been tried out and they work exceedingly well. This machine has been patented and will be manufactured extensively by Eugene men.

Patterson In Jail.

A. J. Patterson of Junction, was arrested last week charged with statutory rape, was arraigned before Justice Bryson in Eugene Thursday. He waived examination and his bail was fixed at \$1000, in default of which he was placed in jail until the March term of court.

Patterson is in the neighborhood of 70 years of age. He does not bear a very good reputation and it is claimed that a good many have been getting their liquor at his premises.

As previously stated the penalty for the crime of statutory rape is not less than three nor more than twenty years. If convicted, his sentence will probably mean life as he is an old man now.
